The English 9 Student Learning Outcomes are "compose a multi-paragraph essay that uses a strong thesis statement, compose a multi-paragraph essay that uses text with properly conjugated and properly used verbs, and compose a multi-paragraph essay that uses correctly formed sentences with virtually no errors of fragments, comma splices, and run-ons."
- Course Requirements: Essays and their Drafts; In-class Work; Reading Assignments; Homework; and a Common Final Exam.

ATTENDANCE: Keep in mind that you should not be absent more than twice this semester. <u>In-class writing assignments, homework, and quizzes cannot be made up if you are late or absent,</u> and essay assignments will accrue late penalties unless I excuse your absence. Please, be prepared to <u>document</u> your emergency or illness when asking for an excused absence. I will accept doctor's notes, towing slips, auto repair bills, court papers etc. <u>Schedule conflicts (with</u> <u>work or appointments on campus, etc.) are not excused</u>. Please, give this documentation to me within a week of the absence.

- Late or Missing Essays: For each class session an essay is late, the essay's grade will drop one letter (ex: a B- essay would become a C- essay).
