Overview and Goals and Student Learning Outcomes:

At the conclusion of the course, you should be able to: Describe the historical development and the constitutionality of the rules of evidence and how it ties into the criminal justice system: Explain and identify the procedural rules and constitutionality for arrest, search and seizure; 3: Define hearsay, rules of admissibility, and understand the exceptions to the Hearsay Rule. Your success will be measured by written examination, your participation in classroom discussions, and written homework assignments.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING

Consequently, there will be <u>no make-up quiz</u> for any quiz you miss, <u>whatever the reason</u> for your absence. Your course grade will ultimately include the three highest quiz grades,(keeping in the mind the exception above) and the final exam Each quiz counts as 20%, and the final counts as 30% of the total course grade..
