ENGLISH 2 GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION FOR ESL Spring 2013

INSTRUCTOR: Jesus Padilla

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

ESL 2 is a grammar class in an English-only environment designed for the low-intermediate ESL student. The course will cover grammar and simple sentence writing.

COURSE OBJECTIVE:

- 1. Demonstrate competency in classifying the following parts of speech: nouns, verbs, pronouns, adjectives, adverbs of frequency, and prepositions.
- 2. Demonstrate competency in creating affirmative and negative statements, yes/no questions, and wh-questions with the verb "be" and other verbs in the simple present, present progressive, the simple past, and the four future forms to indicate planning, predicting, and scheduling; demonstrate the ability to use the past progressive and "used to" in the above mentioned forms.
- 3. Demonstrate mastery in using the modal "can" for ability; demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce modal verbs of ability, request, permission, and advice.
- 4. Demonstrate competency in using singular and plural nouns, including correct spelling, and appropriate forms, and with expressions of quantity for count and non-count nouns using corresponding articles.
- 5. Demonstrate competency with the use of subject and object pronouns, and possessive adjectives.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to use, produce, and recognize level appropriate vocabulary in a variety of oral, and written exercises.
- Demonstrate the ability to write sentences, and a 5-7 sentence paragraph in one or more of the above-mentioned grammatical areas with correct capitalization and ending punctuation (period, question mark, and exclamation mark).

CLASS RULES:

- You must have a textbook and workbook in class. If you don't have both books in class you won't get class participation credit, and as a result it will lower your grade in class.
- Students are expected to attend every class session and arrive on time for class.
- Three times tardy to class will count as one absence.
- You will be dropped from class after three absences.
- If you leave class early, you will only be given credit for half of the class.
- If you are absent from class, it is your responsibility to get the assignments missed.
- All assignments must be turned in on time. Late assignments will be given 50% of credit only.
- It is strongly advised to be back on time after break, quizzes and important information might be given after break.
- Cell phones must not be used in class. Students are not allowed to walk out of class to answer the phone, don't let phones ring in class put them on vibrator.
- Missed test can only be made up before class and by arranging with teacher ahead of time. Extra credit will not be accepted.

- Bring your textbook, notebook, pencil and dictionary to class. Your are encouraged to participate and ask questions during class.
- Homework and other assignments will be assigned often and must be completed by the following class meeting.
- It is important to speak English in class (with the teacher and also with your classmates).

GRADING: Homework, class work, oral presentations, quizzes, unit tests, mid-term, and final exam will count for your final grade at the end of the semester.
