Instructional Methods:

The course is taught using a variety of instructional methods including: Group discussion, lectures, Blackboard and student collaboration.

Measurable course objectives/student learning outcomes

Preparation for ENGL 101 (ENGL 1A). The course seeks to facilitate the student's mastery of the short essay at the college level. The course follows in sequence from ENGL 08 (ENGL 98).

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop and apply discovery techniques for expository writing with five or more multi-paragraph essays, including a mini research paper.
- Design an essay plan based on concrete data in pre-writing exercises that produces a controlling idea or thesis statement.
- Organize content to support a thesis statement and subsequent supporting paragraphs while studying and applying various rhetorical modes with emphasis on comparison/contrast, definition, cause/effect, and argumentation.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to recognize and identify various audiences, both general and academic, focusing on academic audiences.
- 5. Synthesize ideas and information from multiple sources in the development of a writing assignment that is supported by citations from the reading.
- 6. Practice a variety of sentence types and demonstrate principles of effective sentence construction and punctuation, including correct use of the comma, semicolon, quotation mark, apostrophe, and parentheses.
- 7. Demonstrate an understanding of connotative meaning and figurative language in his/her own writing after recognizing this technique in the writing of others.
- 8. Practice and successfully demonstrate the skills in areas designated by the instructor to be appropriate supplemental activities of improved writing technique.

Student Learning Outcomes for English 009:

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- Compose a multiple-paragraph essay that responds to an essay prompt with a clear controlling idea or thesis statement.
- 2. Compose a multi-paragraph essay with a clear organizational structure and adequate support.
- Compose a multi-paragraph that uses correctly formed sentences with virtually no sentence-level or grammar errors.
- 4. Develop a research paper that effectively synthesizes ideas and information from multiple sources and utilizes correct MLA formatting of citations.

*Attendance is very important in this course, as you will be doing a majority of the work in class, as each class meeting will help promote and build your writing skills. You will become a better writer upon completion of this course. Since most writing is done in class it may not be made up. I understand that life happens, should you have an emergency please e-mail me beforehand so arrangements can be made. Please make arrangements with instructor or a fellow student to keep up with all assignments in case you cannot attend a class session for any reason.

Classwork and Homework:

Classwork refers to in-class writing or assignments, peer review worksheets, paragraphs, Blackboard discussions and essays. Homework refers to any assigned work (such as worksheets, paragraph drafts, grammar exercises, etc.) that is to be taken home and completed as well as exercises assigned from the textbook and Blackboard.

You must do your homework if you wish to do well in this class. Doing homework prepares you for the day's class, so late homework is subjected to a penalty. Late work will only be worth half credit-no exceptions!

Midterm & Final Essay:

The midterm will be an in-class essay based on what we have worked on throughout the semester. The final essay will be the common final as required by IVC. Students must receive a passing grade on the common final in order to proceed to English 101.

Class Participation:

Participation includes student preparedness and responses to given questions asked during class time. There may be some controversial subjects discussed in class, so I ask you to please be respectful of other students' opinions. All homework (with the exception of in class assignments) must be typed. No exceptions. If you do not have access to a computer at home, there are computers available to you on campus.

Blackboard:

Blackboard is a new learning program recently implemented by IVC, it is new to me and probably to several students. I don't expect you to be the expert, because I am still learning myself, but it is a program that should be mastered as soon as possible. Assignments will be posted regularly on Blackboard (BB). It is also important that you check your email and the Blackboard home page as I often send messages through BB. For certain assignments, you may also be required to submit or turn in your work through BB. ALL Blackboard assignments are due at midnight on the due date. If you fail to submit your discussion you WILL LOSE participation points for that discussion. The discussions on Blackboard should be thorough; this is a college level course. One sentence or two is NOT acceptable.

Cheating and Plagiarism:

"Dishonesty in the classroom is considered a very serious offense. Any form of cheating, turning in work which is not one's own (plagiarism), is grounds for disciplinary action. The consequences of these actions are severe and may include the possibility of expulsion."

Academic misconduct includes misconduct associated with the classroom, laboratory or clinical learning process. Some examples of academic misconduct are cheating and plagiarism.

Cheating includes, but is not limited to, (a) use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, assessment tests or examinations; (b) dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the faculty member in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; or (c) the acquisition, without permission, of tests or other academic material belonging to a member of the college faculty or staff.

Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the use of paraphrased or directly quoted published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials. Information gathered from the internet and not properly identified is also considered plagiarism.

Any student found by a faculty member to have committed academic misconduct may be subject to sanctions as determined by the faculty member. Sanctions MAY include a warning, grade adjustment, and course failure. Consequences for plagiarism include a zero on the assignment and a referral to Sergio Lopez, Dean of Student Development and Campus Events.
