<u>Objectives</u>: By the end of this course you should have the ability to utilize a variety of intermediate to advanced grammatical structures in a written paragraph form. Structure #1— the simple, progressive, and perfect verb tenses; Structure #2-- clauses; Structure #3—conditionals; Structure #4—modals; Structure #5—gerunds/infinitives

<u>Outcomes</u>: Demonstrate understanding of dependant and independent clauses with correct punctuation to create sentences; identify and use adjective clauses to solve various life problems; demonstrate the knowledge of noun clauses by creating sentences using them.

<u>Required Texts</u>: --Focus on Grammar 4, A High-Intermediate Course for Reference and Practice, 4th Ed. Student Book and Workbook, 4th Edition (NEW EDITION)
<u>Suggested Resources</u>: Thesaurus, Dictionary

<u>Final Exam</u>: Final exams will be given on the first class meeting during finals week, and the final will be conducted in the same classroom where the class meets during the semester. If an instructor feels that more than one hour is needed to complete the final, he/she can opt to have students meet for a second time during finals week.
