ENGLISH 11 SPEAKING AND LISTENING FOR ESL SPRING 2013

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

ESL 11 is a grammar-based speaking class in an English-only Environment, for the beginning ESL student. Listening comprehension and speaking skills will be developed through basic dialogues, modeled tasks, and communicative activities.

COURSE OBJECTIVE:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize the simple present, present progressive, future (be going to), and simple past.
- 2. Demonstrate the ability to recognize, respond to, and produce affirmative, negative, and interrogative sentences.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to use and recognize the modal auxiliary "can" (ability) in oral exercises.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, respond to, and produce adjectives in correct word order as well as adverbs of frequency.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce singular and plural nouns, subject, object pronouns, and possessive adjectives.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize and produce prepositions of time and location in oral exercises.
- 7. Create and present short dialogs on limited topics illustrating a particular function or situation.

CLASS RULES:

You must have a textbook and workbook in class. If you don't have both books in class, you won't get class participation credit, and as a result it will lower your grade in class.

- Students are expected to attend every class session and arrive on time for class.
- Three times tardy to class will count as one absence.
- You will be dropped from class after three absences.
- If you leave class early, you will only be given credit for half of the class.
- If you are absent from class, it is your responsibility to get the assignments missed.
- All assignments must be turned in on time. Late assignments will be given 50% of credit only.
- It is strongly advised to be back on time after break.

- Missed tests can only be made up before class and by arranging with teacher ahead of time. Extra credit will not be accepted.
