Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Student will demonstrate the use of discovery techniques in writing and interpret readings, thereby developing his/her own point of view for further writing.
- 2. Student will show supporting details in his/her own writing as well as identify and evaluate supporting details in the writing of others.
- 3. Student will apply the principles of essay structure, focusing on introduction-body conclusion, thesis statement, rhetorical modes, and will be able to identify, analyze, and apply the principles of essay coherence in others' own writing.
- 4. Student will identify logical fallacies and apply the principles of the nature of evidence, as well as identify and analyze, essay coherence, especially in relation to tone, purpose, and audience.
- 5. Student will develop text interpretation supported by citations, synthesized with the study and application of research documentation and library skills to produce a research paper.
- 6. Student will practice connotative and figurative language, while writing for an academic audience requiring carefully edited sentences.
- 7. Student will write a series of at least 4 essays, incorporating the rhetorical modes, along with a persuasive research paper, composing a total of 8,000-10,000 words. Expository and argumentative papers constitute the bulk of student writing. However, revisions, summaries; journals or other assigned writing may be used to meet the requirement.
- 8. Student will participate in a number of activities and areas of study as deemed appropriate by instructor.

Student Learning Outcomes for English 110:

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Demonstrate mastery of research strategies, including appropriate use and correct documentation of research materials.
- 2. Demonstrate mastery of pre-writing strategies, including brainstorming and outlining.
- 3. Develop an essay of multiple pages that effectively presents and strongly supports a thesis statement.
- 4. Demonstrate command of rules regarding plagiarism and academic ethics.

Class Policies/Rules:

- 1. Be polite and respectful
- 2. Missing more than two class meetings may result in the student being dropped from course.
- 3. Please turn off cell phones before coming to class. **I am serious about this**. If your cell phone rings I will take participation points away.
- 4. Tardiness is not acceptable, being more than 15 minutes late is considered a tardy. Three tardies will equal one absence. Please take care of your personal business before class.

- 6. Absolutely no cheating. If you are caught cheating you will get a zero for the assignment; this includes plagiarism.

*Attendance is very important in this course, as you will be doing a majority of the work in class, as each class meeting will help promote and build your writing skills. You will become a better writer upon completion of this course. Since most writing is done in class it may not be made up. I understand that life happens, should you have an emergency please e-mail me beforehand so arrangements can be made. Please make arrangements with instructor or a fellow student to keep up with all assignments in case you cannot attend a class session for any reason.

Classwork and Homework:

Classwork refers to in-class writing or assignments, peer review worksheets, paragraphs, Blackboard discussions and essays. Homework refers to any assigned work (such as worksheets, paragraph drafts, grammar exercises, etc.) that is to be taken home and completed as well as exercises assigned from the textbook and Blackboard.

You must do your homework if you wish to do well in this class. Doing homework prepares you for the day's class, no late work is accepted.

Midterm & Final Essay:

The midterm will be an in-class essay based on what we have worked on throughout the semester. There will be a two-part final: an essay and a short-response/essay test based on the book you will be reading throughout the semester.

Class Participation:

Participation includes student preparedness and responses to given questions asked during class time. There may be some controversial subjects discussed in class, so I ask you to please be respectful of other students' opinions. All homework (with the exception of in class assignments) must be typed. No exceptions. If you do not have access to a computer at home, there are computers available to you on campus.

Blackboard:

Blackboard is a new learning program recently implemented by IVC, it is new to me and probably to several students. I don't expect you to be the expert, because I am still learning myself, but it is a program that should be mastered as soon as possible. Assignments will be posted regularly on Blackboard (BB). It is also important that you check your email and the Blackboard home page as I often send messages through BB. For certain assignments, you may also be required to submit or turn in your work through BB. **ALL** Blackboard assignments are due at midnight on the due date. If you fail to submit your discussion you **WILL LOSE** participation points for that discussion. The discussions on Blackboard should be thorough; this is a college level course. One sentence or two is **NOT** acceptable.

There will be a total of 10 discussion questions on Blackboard (BB). The questions will be based on the <u>Crime and</u> <u>Punishment</u> book. The maximum amount of points you can earn is 100.

Cheating and Plagiarism:

"Dishonesty in the classroom is considered a very serious offense. Any form of cheating, turning in work which is not one's own (plagiarism), is grounds for disciplinary action. The consequences of these actions are severe and may include the possibility of expulsion."

Academic misconduct includes misconduct associated with the classroom, laboratory or clinical learning process. Some examples of academic misconduct are cheating and plagiarism.

Cheating includes, but is not limited to, (a) use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, assessment tests or examinations; (b) dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the faculty member in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; or (c) the acquisition, without permission, of tests or other academic material belonging to a member of the college faculty or staff.

Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the use of paraphrased or directly quoted published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials. Information gathered from the internet and not properly identified is also considered plagiarism.

Any student found by a faculty member to have committed academic misconduct may be subject to sanctions as determined by the faculty member. Sanctions MAY include a warning, grade adjustment, and course failure. Consequences for plagiarism include a zero on the assignment and a referral to Sergio Lopez, Dean of Student Development and Campus Events.
