Course Description: ESL 002 is a grammar class in an English-only environment designed for the low-intermediate ESL student. The course will cover grammar and simple sentence writing.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

1. Demonstrate knowledge of definite and indefinite articles by completing sentence.
2. Differentiate the correct use of prepositions with regard to time or location.
3. Identify the correct form of a verb to convey the meaning of a completed past event.
4. Identify the correct form of a verb to convey the meaning of a routine or a repeated action in the third person singular present tense form.
5. Differentiate the correct form of a verb to use as determined by a time clue or time expression used to indicate either a simple completed past event or a simple repeated action/routine in the present tense.

Exams: There will be a final in this class. It will be cumulative, which means it will include everything we have covered in class. Note that if you don’t do the assignments and pay attention in class, you will do poorly.

Participation: Participation is a vital component of this course. You are expected to contribute to class discussions on a regular basis. Unwillingness to participate will result in deduction of points from your final grade.

Grading: It is based on a 1000 point total, which includes homework assignment, tests, final exam, and participation.
