Course Description:

World Regional Geography is a survey course which introduces students to the physical and cultural geographic aspects of the world realms. Geography's interdisciplinary approach is used to analyze regions and illustrate their interdependence. (CSU, UC)

Course Objectives:

-Provide an understanding of how world regions are similar and different in regards to politics, culture, and economics.

-Enable the student to develop a better mental map of the world and to be able to identify important regions of the world.

-Enable the student to demonstrate their knowledge on how man has had an impact on the world and environments.
