### **Course Outline:**

An introduction to music literature w/ emphasis on listening experiences. Students study the expressive materials of music and the major forms of music literature. Emphasis placed on skills and understanding necessary for lifelong music listening experience.

Learn to identify all instruments in orchestra by appearance and sound. 3) Identify the "form" of classical/jazz compositions. 4) Identify names of important Baroque composers and their compositions

**Text:** To receive proper course credit, have your own textbook as soon as possible which can be purchased at the bookstore. The name of the textbook is Music, An Appreciation / brief 7<sup>th</sup> Edition ( w/CD's ) by Roger Kamien.
