Class Information: English 003 is a grammar class in an English-only environment designed for the intermediate student. Bring your textbook, three-ring notebook, your completed homework and sharpened pencil to class every day. Be prepared to speak English only and to participate actively in class. There will be a test after every chapter we cover. You will also have grammar assignments in the computer lab to help you practice.

Course Content: This is a grammar course, a continuation of English 002. You will learn to use the simple past and past continuous tenses, the present perfect, modals and gerunds and infinitives. The emphasis will be on using this material in meaningful contexts.

Course Objectives: Students will be able to:

- 1. Show competency with the present perfect tense in affirmative, negative and interrogative sentences.
- 2. Show competency in identifying and using passive voice.
- 3. Show mastery in using comparative, superlative and equative adjectives and adverbs, and in correct syntactic use of adverbs of frequency..
- 4. Show competency with forms of "other."
- 5. Show mastery with modal auxiliary verbs of request, permission, advice, suggestions, preferences, necessity, prohibition, expectation, possibility, impossibility and conclusions.
- 6. Show competency with adjective clauses using relative pronouns who, whom, which, that, whose, when and where.
- 7. Show mastery in using reflexive and reciprocal pronouns.
- 8. Show competency in the use of gerunds and infinitives as subjects and objects.
- 9. Write sentences and short paragraphs of six to ten sentences incorporating the above-mentioned grammatical areas.
- 10. Show mastery in recognition and usage of the major parts of speech: nouns, pronouns, verbs, adjectives, and prepositions of location.
