Course Description

This course will cover the techniques of handling juvenile offenders and victims, prevention and repression of delinquency, diagnosis and referral, organization of community resources, juvenile law and procedures.

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

Examine the development of America's juvenile system from its inception to the present.

Categorize current juvenile problems and explain the juvenile system response to each of the problems.

Compare and contrast the organization and jurisdiction of local, state and federal juvenile justice system entities. Critique its differences and similarities.

Explain how specific laws regulate the investigation, arrest, detention, and disposition of juvenile offenders and victims. Identify how the juvenile offender is processed through the juvenile system.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Students will be expected to read one to two chapters per week in order to be prepared for the lecture. Quizzes will be provided in order to ensure that students are meeting this requirement.

Evaluation Methodology and Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Your grade in this course is based on the accumulation of percentage points generated from the following: There will be two exams, a mid-term and a final examination. Each one of these exams is worth a quarter of your grade. The lowest test score from the two exams will be dropped. However, the mid-term and final exams **MUST** be taken. Additionally, quizzes will count for the last 25% of your grade. Moreover, extra points can

be earned by making oral presentations to the class. A maximum of 10 percentage (extra credit) points can be earned per student, per testing period.

Grades will be based on the following percentages:

90% to 100% = A 80% to 89% = B 70% to 79% = C 60% to 69% = D 0% to 59% = F

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class will be dropped by the instructor. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class.
