Course Description

A continued exploration of personalized approaches to content and materials to address complex subject matter and concepts using a variety of drawing mediums, techniques, and methodologies at an advanced drawing level. Students in this course will develop a portfolio for transfer or professional endeavors. Additional materials fee applies. (CSU, UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Present a final portfolio including all work done during the semester, suitable for submission to four year institution, art school or art gallery venues. (ILO2, ILO3, ILO4, ILO5)
- 2. Critique works of art either in written or oral form using proper terminology. (ISO1, ISLO2, ISO3, ISLO4, ISLO5)
- 3. Create a substantial capstone project on theme of student's choice. (ILO2, ILO3, ILO4, ILO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explore formal skills, conceptual approaches and the application of formal elements as applied to image making with a focus on the development of personal style at an advanced level.
- 2. Explore traditional and contemporary approaches to the construction and presentation of drawings at an advanced level of engagement in relation to personal style.
- 3. Practice critical evaluation and critique of class projects and artwork from a museum or gallery using relevant terminology in oral or written form.
- 4. Design, process, and produce an advanced portfolio of drawings suitable for submission to four-year institutions and galleries in multiple mediums and formats using personal methodology and concepts that integrate form and content and express ideas through visual means.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

- Participation in class: Students are required to attend all regular class meetings on time. Absences from class and excessive tardiness will result in a loss of points towards the final grade. Students should inform the instructor by e-mail (preferred) or telephone if it is necessary to be late or to miss a class.
- **Portfolio for drawings completed**: There will be a minimum number of drawings required at the end of the semester. Portfolios are reviewed **two times** during the semester. You don't know which drawings I will be asking for, so **KEEP EVERYTHING!**
- **Sketch Journal:** The sketch journal is the tool artists use to give visual form to their thoughts. Ideas that are not given visual form will disappear. Sketch journals should have drawings as well as writing and collage elements. It is the record of thought process of the artist. Working in the sketch journal should be part of any artist's daily life. Sketch journals will be evaluated several times during the semester for extra credit and on a daily basis for homework assignments. Bring your journal to every class meeting. Evaluations for extra credit will, in some cases, be unannounced. A *Journal Evaluation Form* might be taped inside the front cover of your sketchbook.
- **Final Portfolio Review:** Portfolios of work completed by each student will be reviewed by the instructor two times during the semester. <u>Students will make an appointment with the instructor for this purpose</u>. There will be two class sessions set aside for the purpose of preparing portfolios for review.
- Final critique will be during the last 2 regular class meetings of the semester.
- Written Assignments: Students will be required to complete at least two papers describing their observations to visits to museums, galleries, and/or cultural events and one essay about a work of art in a museum or about a historical or contemporary artist.

Instructional Methods:

Lectures/demonstrations and audio-visual presentations; ongoing studio critiques and discussions; studio, gallery and museum visits; guest speakers.

Students are expected to actively participate in the above, as well as to complete studio projects, written assignments, portfolios for review and attend cultural events/places.

<u>Out of Class Assignments</u>: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time <u>and</u> two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Attendance

Required language
