CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

ESL 011 is a grammar-based speaking class in an English-only environment, for the beginning ESL student. Listening comprehension and speaking skills will be developed through basic dialogues, modeled tasks and communicative activities. (Nontransferable, non-degree applicable)

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES: Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and/or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Apply knowledge of English pronunciation rules to correctly identify and/or produce past tense endings. (ILO1)
- 2. Differentiate and clearly pronounce minimal pairs. (ILO 1)
- 3. Apply knowledge of English pronunciation rules to correctly identify and/or produce singular and plural forms of both nouns and verbs. (ILO 1, ISL 2)
- 4. Participate in speeches/conversations/presentations utilizing the format and vocabulary of the identified speech act (ISL 1, ISL 2)
- 5. Listen to a passage or conversation and identify the main idea and supporting details, either orally or in writing. (ISL 1, ISL 2)

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to use and recognize the simple present, present progressive, future (be + going to), simple past.
- 2. Demonstrate the ability to recognize, respond, and produce affirmative, negative, and interrogative sentences in aural and oral exercises.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to use and recognize the modal auxiliary "can" (ability) in aural exercises.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce adjectives in correct word order as well as adverbs of frequency in oral and aural exercises.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce singular and plural nouns, subject and object pronouns, possessive adjective forms, with singular, plural, and possessive noun forms in oral and aural exercises.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to use, recognize, and produce prepositions of time and location in oral and aural exercises.
- 7. Demonstrate the ability to recognize, and produce vowel and consonant contrasts in minimal pairs, /t/ and /th/, /b/ and /v/, /j/ and /y/, /ch/ and /sh/, long and short vowel

- sounds, the third person singular, possessive, and plural (/s/, /z/, /iz/), the past tense (/tid/, /d/, or /t/), and /s/+ consonant combinations.
- 8. Create and present short dialogs on limited topics illustrating a particular function or situation.
- 9. Create and present impromptu conversations on limited topics illustrating a particular function or situation.
- 10. Demonstrate the ability to use, produce, and recognize level appropriate vocabulary in a variety of oral, aural, and written exercises.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS & INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS

Lectures based on each lesson. Students will engage in activities related to the lessons – whole group activities, pair work, and individual work.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC (Western Association of Schools and Colleges) has adopted a similar requirement.

COURSE GRADING BASED ON COURSE OBJECTIVES

It is estimated that each student should invest 10 hours a week on class preparation. Each student is responsible for required readings and written/spoken assignments from each unit in the textbook and workbook. In addition to that, as part of your assignments, you will be required to go to the Language Laboratory once a week for 1 hour (60 minutes) and work on specific assignments. (Student ID card is required to use the Language Laboratory.) Throughout the semester you will give a variety of speeches: 1) *My Favorite Relative* (March 20, 2015); 2) *Report on in an Interview with a Classmate* (April 24, 2015); 3) *My Plans for the Future* (May 22, 2015).
