Course Description

This class is designed to prepare students to take the American Red Cross First Responder certification test. Giving the students the confidence to respond to emergencies with the knowledge and the skills necessary in an emergency to help sustain life, reduce pain, and minimize the consequences of injury or sudden illness until professional medical help arrives. (CSU, UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Explain how the EMS system works and the citizen responder's role. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
- 2. Demonstrate the care given for choking and other breathing emergencies. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
- 3. Recognize the signals of a possible heart attack and describe the care for someone who is experiencing chest pain. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4, ILO5)
- 4. Explain and identify types of wounds, control bleeding and bandage appropriately. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Assess victims of injury and medical emergencies and apply emergency action plan.
- 2. Describe the signs and symptoms associated with common medical emergencies Demonstrate the first aid care that is needed in common medical emergencies.
- 3. Demonstrate cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of AED.
- 4. Demonstrate bandaging and splinting techniques.
- 5. Demonstrate emergency rescue moves.
- 6. Evaluate their lifestyle for health and safety concerns and set personal goals for achieving a safe and healthy lifestyle.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Teaching Methods: During this class you will have opportunity to participate in a variety of presentation and teaching methods. Lectures, including material not covered in your readings, class and group discussions requiring your active participation, student oral presentations, and films will supplement your required readings.
