Course Description

The course will cover the philosophy of Administration of Justice in America and identify its various sub-systems. It will examine the roles and role expectations of criminal justice agents and their interrelationship in society. The concepts of crime causations, punishment and rehabilitation are introduced. This basic course provides a better understanding of the criminal justice system and orients the students to career opportunities. Ethics, education and training for professionalism in the system are discussed. (C-ID AJ 110) (CSU, UC)

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Identify the Objectives of the Justice System and the Role of Criminal Justice Personnel. (ILO4, ILO5)
2. Describe the Laws of Arrest including Felonies and Misdemeanors. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
3. Identify the Roles, History and Organization of Law Enforcement in the U.S. (ILO4, ILO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Summarize the evolution of the Administration of Justice System.
2. Demonstrate an awareness of the objectives of the system, the crime problem and role expectations of criminal justice personnel.
3. Distinguish the system 's responsibilities to the community, social implications of crime and general concepts in crime causation.
4. Compare and contract various agencies, their organizational structures and develop an appreciation of the education, training and professionalism in the justice system.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of basic legal terms, the organization and concepts of the United States court system and identify the roles, functions and relationships of persons within the court system.

6. Summarize the history, structure and operation of the American correctional system.
7. Compare and contrast the juvenile justice system and its interrelationships with the criminal justice system.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Your grade will be calculated based on 3 quizzes or tests, the final examination, and homework and class participations. All quizzes/tests are comprehensive. Pop-quizzes may be used. A total of 4 quizzes or test (excluding the final) will be given over the semester. You may drop your lowest quiz grade unless that grade is an F you receive because of cheating or plagiarism. Since you can drop your lowest quiz grade **NO MAKE-UP QUIZ WILL BE GIVEN.** You cannot drop your final examination grade. The grade calculation will be as follows:

Three quizzes = 20% each or 60% of your total grade

Homework and class participation = 10% of your total grade

Final examination = 30% of your total grade

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See [General Catalog](#) for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped. For online courses, students who fail to complete required activities for two consecutive weeks may be considered to have excessive absences and may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.
- You are expected to be present for the whole class period. If you leave early from class you cannot be considered present for that day. Attendance is taken at the end of class.
- Do not come to class if you are ill, because you risk infecting others nor if you are under the influence.
- Do not come and go during class sessions, except for an urgent reason.

Classroom Etiquette

- Electronic Devices: Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class, unless otherwise directed by the instructor.
- Food and Drink are prohibited in all classrooms. Water bottles with lids/caps are the only exception. Additional restrictions will apply in labs. Please comply as directed by the instructor.

Online Netiquette

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
