#### **Course Description**

The course is designed to provide the student with information on the processing systems of the body and how they react to alcohol and drugs. This course will seek to explain where and how drugs act and why. The course will bring about an understanding of how drugs influence consciousness, mood and feeling. It will enable students to understand that both the internal and external environments have important effects on the well-being of the individual. (CSU)

- 3. Identify post-acute withdrawal symptoms for addicts as well as family members (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO5).


# **Course Objectives**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify the physiological functioning of the central nervous system.
- 2. Describe the disease concept of alcoholism.
- 3. Explain the pharmacological effects of alcohol on the entire nervous system.
- 4. Explain the pharmacological effects of alcohol on the entire organ system (i.e., cardiovascular, gastrointestinal, respiratory, reproductive, urogenital, skin, blood, endocrine, and fluid balance systems).
- 5. Recognize the physiological effects of sedative/hypnotic drugs and tranquilizers.
- 6. Recognize the physiological effects of narcotics and other analgesics.
- 7. Identify the physiological effects of stimulants.
- 8. Identify the physiological effects of marijuana and other hallucinogenic drugs.

Orientation for "Inside" students will be on Monday, February 23<sup>rd</sup>, from 11:00am-2:10pm at the DRC.

#### **Attendance**
