Course Description: Open to all students who have an interest in learning to sing and who enjoy music. Breath control, tone placement, articulation and enunciation are emphasized. Rehearsal, performance and study of choral literature are entailed. Introduction to music theory as a means of learning to read music rather than learning by rote is done. Maximum credit is 2 units. (CSU, UC)

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to 1. Demonstrate knowledge and performance skills in a variety of choral repertoire from moderate to advanced levels of difficulty; and from genres including Classical, Jazz, Gospel, Easy-Listening, World music, Spirituals, Songs from Musical Shows, Broadway Tunes, and Pop Tunes; 2. Additionally, demonstrate professional decorum during public performances on and off-campus (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, and ILO5)

Course Objectives: Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to: 1. Correctly perform vocal parts from a varied literature for chorus, both accompanied and A Capella in concert; 2. Correctly perform assigned vocal parts from a varied literature for chorus, both accompanied and A Capella in rehearsal; 3. Demonstrate proper vocal technique appropriate to the style of the composition being performed; 4. Correctly interpret music notation symbols of pitch, dynamics, and expression; 5. Recall details about the style, period, and performance practices of the composers and compositions studied in class; 6. Isolate technical performance problems in rehearsal, and systematically apply standard rehearsal techniques to them; 7. Correctly sing assigned vocal parts using solfeggio (do-re-mi, etc., or 1, 2, 3, etc.); 8. Correctly memorize assigned vocal parts; 9. Correctly balance the individual voice within the choral ensemble, so as to produce a choral sound, appropriate to the style of the composition being performed.

Textbooks and References/Supplements: 1. *Choral Ensemble Selections*, provided by the instructor; 2. *Choral Sight-Singing materials*, provided by the instructor 3. *Choral Research Assignments*, given by the instructor; 4. *A Black or a White 3-ring Binder*, for your Choral music; 5. *IVC Polo Choir T-Shirt*, obtainable from IVC Bookstore

Class Requirements and Instructional Methods: Students are expected to attend choir class regularly and punctually. Students will participate wholeheartedly in all class activities, including warm-ups, music theory learning, rehearsal of varied choral repertoire, marking of

musical scores as appropriate, and more. Students will attend scheduled musical performances and give of their best. Students will be orderly and disciplined during choir classes and performances, and endeavor to maintain proper decorum. Talking should be minimized or non-existent during rehearsals and performances. Students will be great team-members of the choral ensemble. Students will gain confidence in themselves as blossoming musical artistes.

Please note that this is a Choral Performance Class, hence participation in Concerts is important and mandatory. Final Exam/Concert will be on Sunday December 6th, 2015 at 2:00pm, at First United Methodist Church Hall, El Centro (312 S. Eighth Street).

Class Attendance: A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class, will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of the class. Should readmission be desired, the student’s status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student’s responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See General catalog for details.

Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week, may be dropped.

Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as ‘excused’ absences.

Classroom Etiquette: Electronic Devices – Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class unless otherwise directed by the instructor.
