Course Description

This course introduces students to the PHP programming language, the MySQL relational database system commonly used to create dynamic websites. Topics include PHP syntax, using phpMyAdmin, creating tables and queries using SQL, web application security, frameworks, and other related topics. It also includes basics of using content management systems for managing website content. (CSU)

- 8. Analyze how PHP and MySQL have been used to create Content Management Systems
- 9. Analyze the benefits of using a PHP Web Application Framework
- 10. List and explain the most common types of web application security vulnerabilities
- 11. Debug common PHP programming mistakes
- 12. Setup a local development environment on home PCs.

To receive credit, homework must be turned in on time at the beginning of each class session (**late homework assignments will not be accepted**). Due to the length of time that will be given for each project, students must turn in everything completed on the project due date to receive credit (**late project assignments will not be accepted**). Quizzes will be conducted via Blackboard. They will be generally be short and will be based off of homework, lecture and possibly lab materials already covered. **Your attendance in class is important**.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. - You will be expected to read 2 chapters each week from the books that will be used in the course and I expect everyone to have a copy of the book by Week 2, though you should get started with Chapter 1 & 2 for Week 1 so please order your copies online or buy them in the bookstore as soon as you can.
- For any code you are required to turn in I'll expect it to be posted online at http://spaces.imperial.edu/students using SFTP to upload your files to the server and I'll expect it to be turned in within Blackboard too (for Blackboard you'll have to gather your files and ZIP them and upload the ZIP file to Blackboard).
- There will be 3-6 projects during the semester, which will demonstrate that you've gained the required knowledge to meet the Student Learning Outcomes for the course.

Classroom Etiquette
