Course Description

This course will explore the place of philosophy in intelligent living through the methods of rational inquiry. Emphasis is placed upon problems of value and human nature. The goal of the course is to help students understand the main fields of philosophy and teach students how to think and write critically about philosophical questions such as these.

Final grades will be determined by class participation, quizzes, a short paper, and four exams, including a final exam, as outlined below:

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Writing assignments will be due at the beginning of class. They will be graded by letters ranging from an A to an F.

The Grading scale is as follows:

There will be Three exams throughout the semester, one midterm and a comprehensive final. Before each exam I will tell you what kinds of topics will be on the test so you can prepare accordingly.

In addition to the Paper and exams, there will be 5 quizzes, each is worth 2% of your final grade. There will also be a term paper (4-6 pages) assigned near the end of the semester. The specifics of the paper will be covered in class.

Finally, a significant component of your final grade will be based on your participation in class. To do well in the class, you should do all of the reading assignments and group work in order to obtain you class participation points.
