Course Description

Exploration of artistic concepts, styles, and creative expression related to intermediate-level drawing, focusing on complex subject matter and concepts using a variety of drawing mediums, techniques, and methodologies. Students in this course will build on fundamental drawing skills to develop personalized approaches to content and materials in exercises covering multiple historical and contemporary approaches to drawing. Additional materials fee applies. (CSU,UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as

demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Develop, create, and present portfolio of original drawings addressing contemporary art issues in a coherent personal style. (ISLO1, ISLO2, ISLO3, ISLO5)
- 2. Critique works of art. (ISO1, ISLO2, ISO3, ISLO4, ISLO5)
- 3. Write a descriptive essay on a contemporary artwork. (ISLO1, ISLO3, ISO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Produce drawings that creatively interpret and apply formal design elements in the production of images in a wide range of media, formats, and surfaces.
- 2. Design and produce a portfolio of drawings in multiple mediums and formats that successfully demonstrates: Subjective and expressive uses of value, Techniques and concepts of abstraction or non-objective art, Experimentation with combinations of wet and dry mediums, Observational, expressive, and conceptual analysis or application of color, Application and drawing techniques for a variety of color media, Non-traditional compositions, formats, surfaces and materials, Conceptually oriented approaches to drawing, Integration of form and content.
- 3. Construct and prepare appropriate supports and surfaces for mixed media drawing.
- 4. Evaluate and critique class projects using relevant terminology in oral or written formats. 5. Examine and describe historical and contemporary developments, trends, materials, and approaches in drawing. 6. Develop and express ideas and concepts through verbal and visual means.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

- **Projects** Three main aspects will be taken in consideration in order to grade projects; **Applied concepts**, **drawing**, and **craft**. Projects equal **40%** of the final grade. (If projects are late the student will lose 1 point) Projects specifications will be posted by the instructor at blackboard.
- Participation in class: Students are required to attend all regular class meetings on time. Absences from class and excessive tardiness will result in a loss of points towards the final grade. Students should inform the instructor by email (preferred) or telephone if it is necessary to be late or to miss a class.
- Portfolio for drawings completed: Portfolios are reviewed two times during the semester, so KEEP EVERYTHING! Portfolios count as part of homework and it should have the student four best art projects.
- Sketch Journal: From the first week of classes (including vacations, and holidays) until the last week of the semester (excluding the week of final exams) the students will work a journal of drawings. An amount of 2 drawings must be created weekly in a special notebook for class. Drawings in any loose paper will not be taken into account as part of the journal of drawings as well as drawings of other classes. The drawings in the diary can be of any theme, fonts, designs, simple cartoons and logos will not be considered as drawings. Students will work in the journal only in hours outside of class. The sketch journal can be your regular 9x10 sketchbook for class, but all the 30 journal drawings should be together in just one side.

At the end of the course the student will have a total of 30 drawings on the sketch journal.

- Final Portfolio Review: Portfolios of work completed by each student will be reviewed by the instructor two times during the semester. Students will make an appointment with the instructor for this purpose. The last portfolio review will occur the last week of May.
- Final critique will be during the last 2 regular class meetings of the semester.
- Written Assignments: Students will be required to complete at least two papers describing their observations to visits to museums, galleries, and/or cultural events and one essay about a work of art in a museum or about a historical or contemporary artist.

Instructional Methods: Lectures/demonstrations and audio-visual presentations; ongoing studio critiques and discussions; studio, gallery and museum visits; guest speakers.

Students are expected to actively participate in the above, as well as to complete studio projects, written assignments, portfolios for review and attend cultural events/places.
