Course Description

French 100 is designed for students with no previous knowledge of French. It is the first in a four-course series leading to a major or minor in French. Translation will not be used.

- 2. Ask/answer questions in order to obtain/convey information on subjects of their choice.

CÉDILLE (as in *français*): Hold down control-key and type a comma (,). Release keys. You will see nothing. Then type a *c*. You will then see *ç*.
