### **Course Description**

This is a basic course on how to play the guitar. Focus will be on tuning, strumming chords and playing simple melodies. (CSU, UC) Students will perform in recitals and community events.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

Perform beginning level-1 melodies in first position with correct pitches, rhythm, fingering, at a reasonable tempo with expressions indications observed. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)

The student will be able to play the following open-string chords: Majors: C,G,D,A,E Minors: Am,Em,Dm, - Sevenths: G7,D7,A7,B7. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)

Students will be able to read and play the 15 natural notes found in first position--C scale (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4) Student will demonstrate the correct way to pluck a guitar using a pick and their right-hand fingers. (ILO2, ILO4)

## **Course Objectives**

The purpose of this course is to teach:

- reading musical notation in the treble clef and how to play single-note melodies in first position. Lessons begin with simple melodies on one string and gradually build up to a melody across all six strings.
- basic harmonic progressions utilizing major, minor, and 7th chord sonorities
- various strum patterns for different time signatures and grooves
- scales and other technical exercises to reinforce muscle memory
- alternative methods of guitar notation such as tablature and chord symbols
- goal-setting and organizational skills by maintaining a practice journal

### Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

The class meeting time is 9:40-11:05 and will include lectures on music theory, instruction on guitar technique and literature, collaboration with peers on group songs, and self-directed practice labs.

<u>Written Quizzes</u>: Students will demonstrate knowledge of music theory and guitar fundamentals through periodic written quizzes.

<u>Playing Quizzes:</u> Students will demonstrate musical knowledge by individually performing songs or exercises in a video recording and emailing the performance to the instructor for a grade. Sight-reading quizzes will be

<u>Self-Directed Practice Lab</u>: Students will utilize in-class practice time to reinforce classroom lessons and advance to material at their own pace. Students will track their lab attendance and progress by submitting a practice journal entry to the instructor for each class meeting.

Performances: Students will perform at two open-mic events which will count as the midterm and final exams.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

### Attendance
