Course Description

COURSE OVERVIEW: Spanish 110 is a continuation of SPAN 100 with the main emphasis on

*the imperfect, preterit, *the reflexive forms for both regular and irregular verbs. *Possessive, *demonstrative adj/adv, *direct and indirect object pronouns, *formal/informal commands, *the subjunctive mood, and verbal and idiomatic expressions will also be studied.

Furthermore, the student will be familiarized with those features of Hispanic culture which reflect the different frame of reference from which the native speaker of Spanish views the world. (CSU) (UC credit limited. See a counselor.) (CAN SPAN 4) (CAN SPAN SEQ A = SPAN 100). **THIS CLASS IS CONDUCTED ENTIRELY IN SPANISH.**

This is a five (5)unit class. Therefore, students should plan to study accordingly.

The student can be successful in SPAN 110 (Formerly SPAN 2) only after having achieved all of the minimal performance objectives specified for SPAN 100 (Formerly SPAN 1). Either a recent course in SPAN 100 or a recent 2 year high school Spanish course with good retention should enable the student to succeed in SPAN 102. For additional oral practice, concurrent enrollment in SPAN 113 (Formerly SPAN 5B) is recommended.

Note: a student's racial/ethnic, economic, or religious background or beliefs is no impediment to learning a language.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Research historical or cultural information about a Spanish-speaking country and prepare an oral and/or written presentation. (ILO1, ILO3, ILO4)
- 2. Organize information about a historical or cultural aspect of a Spanish-Speaking country for a written or oral assignment. (ILO1, ILO3, ILO5)
- 3. Successfully communicate at the novice/elementary level a personal event in the present tense. (ILO1, ILO2)
- Describe basic daily life situations using correct grammatical structures, vocabulary and idiomatic expressions. (ILO1)
- 5. Assess the content and meaning of written Spanish both orally and in writing. (ILO1, ILO4, ILO5)

Course Objectives

: Students will use correct word order and verb forms to make interrogative, affirmative, and negative sentences. Also, will correctly translate commonly used phrases (English-Spanish and Spanish-English). Thirdly, the student will respond orally in the target language using correct syntax and grammar, demonstrate proper cultural demeanor, and use common Spanish speech patterns and phonetic analysis to communicate in the target language.

Objectives will be accomplished by multiple strategy exams, and an oral presentation.

MEASURABLE COURSE OBJECTIVES AND MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR GRADE OF "C":

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the Spanish sound system.
- 2. Use the Spanish writing/spelling system with its diacritical marks, especially the accent.
- 3. Practice receptive skills through coordinated written and spoken material.

4. Practice productive skills, by repetition, use of cognates, and real-life situations appropriate to the university level.

5. Demonstrate knowledge of grammar to allow for communication from controlled use of language forms to open-ended communicative activities.

6. Demonstrate knowledge of the language skills in speaking, listening, writing, and comprehension according to the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Language Proficiency Guidelines.

7. Identify the varieties of Spanish and its speakers through recordings, maps, and videos

Also note: when doing homework and taking exams, you are to save your answers constantly, every 30 sec. or so, in case there is a system disconnect. If you lose your data, you will have to submit your answers again.

ORAL MIDTERM INTERVIEW: You will have a short (5 minutes) oral interview **in Spanish** with your instructor. The oral interview will take place during class time. SEE SCHEDULE for exact date. The questions for this interview will be based on chapter topics covered so far at that point. **No note reading during interview.**

ORAL PRESENTATION: On the week before final examination (**Nov. 27-Dec. 1st**) you will deliver an oral presentation in <u>Spanish</u>.

You will deliver the presentation in front of the instructor not in front of the class.

The topics will be assigned **in class**. The oral presentation exam will be graded on the student's ability to communicate effectively in a conversational situation.

It will be graded on content, preparation, creativity, vocabulary, fluency, pronunciation, and ability to communicate in the **target language (SPANISH**).

More information regarding this exam will be given by the instructor.

Oral presentation topic must be about a Spanish Speaking country: its history, culture, or society.

THIS IS AN ORAL PRESENTATION IN SPANISH. STUDENTS WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO READ, OR USE NOTES AT THE TIME OF DELIVERY. IF YOU READ YOUR PRESENTATION YOU WILL NOT RECEIVE CREDIT.

ON THE DAY OF THE PRESENTATION, STUDENTS WILL SUBMIT:

- A TYPED OUTLINE.
- A TYPED REFERENCE SHEET.
- A THESIS STATEMENT.

ALL IN SEPARATE SHEETS.

WRITTEN EXAMS (EXÁMENES):

 There will be six (6) chapter or *lecciones* exams to be programmed through BLACKBOARD OR MySpanishLab.
 EXAMS MUST BE TAKEN UNDER INSTRUCTOR'S SUPERVITION. OTHERWISE, EXAMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AS PART OF YOUR GRADE.

Exams will be administered online.

ATTN: The system will penalize you for poorly typed answers (it will mark your answer wrong). Thus, you must answer carefully in Spanish. You will be responsible for the correct orthography in Spanish (punctuation, and word accentuation) as well as grammar. YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO TAKE THE EXAM TWICE.

If you have difficulty with this approach, please find an instructor that is not using this evaluation system.

FINAL EXAM

2. <u>The final exam will be comprehensive.</u> That is, it will cover everything since day 1. Exams and quizzes will cover geography, grammar, homework assignments, and class discussions on history, vocabulary, and culture. **FINAL EXAM WILL BE HELD ON TUESDAY, DECEMBER 6**.

<u>NOTE</u>: ALL STUDENTS MUST TAKE THE FINAL EXAM ON THE ASSIGNED DATE. WORK OR HEALTH RELATED EXCUSES MUST BE VERIFIABLE. PLEASE LET THE INSTRUCTOR KNOW ABOUT WORK RELATED EVENTUALITIES <u>3 WEEKS IN</u> <u>ADVANCE</u>.

Please note that exams are going to be administered in the first hour, don't be late otherwise you will lose time. There will be NO MAKE-UP TESTS OR QUIZZES -Except in cases of <u>documented emergencies</u>, at the discretion of the professor. For reasons of fairness and the integrity of the class, there are NO EXCEPTIONS. Make sure you plan on getting to class on time and always come prepared.

• PHOTO DAY

On "exam Thursday" you are to bring a photograph to class similar in length and width to the one shown by your professor on the first week of instruction(from a magazine, journal, or newspaper). Any type of print media will do. Remember: you have an exam, bring a photo.

The photograph must be reflective of a vocabulary or grammar aspect studied in class in order for students to get credit. <u>Therefore, it has to be reflective of a particular chapter's context.</u>

Check-INs: At profesor's office (#1711)

Check-ins are designed to confirm and validate the student's understanding of basic concepts, topics, and ideas studied and practiced up to that point in the semester.

The week after lesson exams have been designated for check-ins. You will have a week to come to your professor's office hours for a check in where you may be asked about your understanding about grammar concepts, lesson's topics.

ATTN: NO LATE CHECK-INS.

If you are in for a check-in you are in for a checking. Your professor will not answer questions about your current grade, or other issues, during that time.

Your professor will require students to sign a check in sheet verifying attendance at the office.

Check-ins will be 5 minutes long or less.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See <u>General Catalog</u> for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped. It is **your** responsibility to let your instructor know that you came in late, in order to remove the absence mark. Your professor will **not** backdate attendance records. **If you feel that you are unable to attend class for the entire period, it is strongly recommended that you do not take this course**. <u>EVERYONE must be here for the</u> <u>final examinations</u>. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**

10%	 Demonstrates excellent preparation: has analyzed case exceptionally well, relating it to readings and other material (e.g., readings, course material, discussions, experiences, etc.). Offers analysis, synthesis, and evaluation of case material, e.g., puts together pieces of the discussion to develop new approaches that take the class further. Contributes in a very significant way to ongoing discussion: keeps analysis focused, responds very thoughtfully to other students' comments, contributes to the cooperative argument-building, suggests alternative ways of approaching material and helps class analyze which approaches are appropriate, etc. Demonstrates ongoing very active involvement. 			

KEY TO YOUR SUCCESS:
