Course Description

Preparation for ENGL 110. This short term course seeks to facilitate the student's mastery of the short essay at the college level. The student completes the entire course in half a semester. The course follows in sequence from ENGL 008 (ENGL 098). (Nontransferable, non-degree applicable)

Course Prerequisite(s)

ENGL 008 or ENGL 097 or ENGL 098 with a grade of "C" or better or appropriate placement.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Develop an essay that contains a thesis statement, provides adequate support, and employs an clear organizational structure. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
- 2. Develop an essay that avoids sentence-level and grammatical errors. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
- 3. Develop a research paper that effectively synthesizes ideas and information from multiple sources and utilizes correct MLA formatting of citations. (ILO1, ILO3, ILO4, ILO5)
- 4. Demonstrate an ability to comprehend and interpret college-level texts, including arguments, without relying on outside sources for assistance (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop and write expository essays totaling at least 4,000 words, including a mini research paper.
- 2. Design an essay plan based on concrete data in pre-writing exercises that produces a controlling idea or thesis statement.
- 3. Organize content to support a thesis statement and subsequent supporting paragraphs while studying and applying various rhetorical modes with emphasis on comparison/contrast, definition, cause/effect, and argumentation.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to write a paper for an academic audience.
- 5. Synthesize ideas and information from multiple sources in the development of a writing assignment that is supported by citations from the reading.
- 6. Practice a variety of sentence types and demonstrate principles of effective sentence construction and punctuation.
- 7. Practice and successfully demonstrate the skills in areas designated by the instructor to be appropriate supplemental activities of improved writing technique.
- 8. Understand academic ethics, and avoid plagiarism.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Study skill techniques that enable anyone to pass the course are taught in class.

Writing:

- This class uses the Writing Workshop Method, which provides time and help in class to improve your writing.
 - o Peer conferences.
 - Essays go through several drafts.
 - All drafts are turned in and earn points.
 - o Essays may be required to be submitted through Canvas.
- Individual teacher/student writing conferences available in class and in my office.
- All essays use MLA format. This will be explained in class.
- Late essays lose 5 points for each day past the due date.
- Classroom: oral discussions, journals, quizzes, essay structure and practice.
- Journals: Minimum length is two paragraphs, with each paragraph having a minimum of seven sentences.

<u>Breaks</u>: There are 10-20 minute breaks during which students may wish to check cell phones, visit the restroom, or walk around outside the classroom.

<u>Out of Class Assignments</u>: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time <u>and</u> two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

- o English 009 is a 4 credit class.
- o 4 hours spent in class.
- o 8 hours spent out-of-class reading, studying, and doing assignments.
- This is a total of 12 hours per week spent on English 009.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

- Grades are weighted as follows:
 - Essays 15%
 - Writing Tests 20%
 - Research Project 15%
 - o Quizzes, Journals, planning, drafts 10%
 - Mid-Term 15%
 - Final Exam 25%
 - There is NO extra credit available.
- Assignments are due when collected, usually at the beginning of class.
 - Missing assignments result in zeros.
 - Zeros can lower grades to the point the student fails the class.
 - Emailed assignments are not accepted unless specifically requested.
- Writing (Essays and Research Project):
 - Planning and drafts must be submitted when due to earn points. Items submitted late do not earn points.
 - Each preparation item (planning, drafts, research items), must be submitted in sequence before the student moves on to the next item.
 - All preparation work must be successfully completed before the assigned item (essays, research paper) can be read and graded.

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- Essays that are submitted after the due date lose 5 points for each day late.
- Students who arrive after an activity has begun are not individually accommodated.
- The course grade in Canvas is what it is and will not be rounded up or rounded down.
- Quizzes:
 - Not all guizzes are announced.
 - Missed quizzes cannot be made up. (No exceptions)
 - o The lowest quiz grade is dropped.
 - Late arrivals are not eligible to take quizzes already in progress.

Writing Tests:

- o Writing Tests practice for the mid-term and the final, are announced. (See class schedule.)
- One missed Writing Test may be made up within five school days of the day it was originally given. A second or third missed Writing Test may not be made up.
- It is the student's responsibility to make arrangements to make up a missed Writing Test.
- Missed Writing Tests are made up in the English Department in the Science Building.

Final Exam

- o A common final exam is given to all English 009 students.in the regular classroom,
- o It is unusual for a student to fail the common final and pass the class.
- o It is possible for a student to pass the common final and fail the class due to zeros for missing work.
- Grades are available through Canvas 24/7

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online
 class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the
 student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's
 responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See General Catalog for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences
 exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped. For online courses, students
 who fail to complete required activities for two consecutive weeks may be considered to have excessive absences
 and may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.

Classroom Etiquette

- <u>Electronic Devices:</u> Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class, unless otherwise directed by the instructor. Cell phones may not be used during class. ebooks may be used on e-readers such as the Nook, Kindle, iPad, iPad mini, or laptops.
- <u>Food and Drink</u> are prohibited in all classrooms. Water bottles with lids/caps in regular classroom are the only exception. Additional restrictions apply in labs. Please comply as directed. (This is a college rule.)
- <u>Disruptive Students:</u> Students who disrupt or interfere with a class may be sent out of the room and told to meet with the Campus Disciplinary Officer before returning to continue with coursework. Disciplinary procedures will be followed as outlined in the General Catalog.

- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons

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(emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

Academic Honesty

- <u>Plagiarism</u> is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to 'cite a source' correctly, you must ask for help.
- <u>Cheating</u> is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
