Course Description

A further study of the concepts of algebra. Topics covered include linear and quadratic equations, relations, functions and graphs, systems of equations, logarithmic and exponential functions, conic sections, and sequences and series. (Nontransferable, AA/AS degree only)

MATH 081 with a grade of "C" or better or appropriate placement

Demonstrate problem solving strategies by identifying an appropriate method to solve a given problem, correctly set up the problem, perform the appropriate analysis and computation, and share their interpretation of the conclusion or the outcome, using correct grammar or in an oral presentation. Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. demonstrate an understanding of radical expressions and equations.
2. demonstrate an ability to solve applications, inequalities and absolute value inequalities.
3. demonstrate and understanding of quadratic functions, including graphing and equations.
4. demonstrate and understanding of functions and relations, including one to one functions.
5. demonstrate and understanding of logarithmic and exponential functions and their graphs.
6. classify and graph ellipses, parabolas, and hyperbolas.
7. demonstrate an understanding of sequences and series and their operations.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Homework: Homework for the semester is available on the MyMathLab and MathXL learning management systems. It is expected that you keep up with the homework. This means that you need to complete homework between class periods. You are also required to keep a homework notebook that will be turned in with your homework on the day of the exam. An example of the expectation of your homework notebook is posted in canvas along with a bad example of a homework notebook.

You may use either:

1. loose leaf notebook paper in a three-ring binder
2. Staple each section together and turn in as a bunch
3. Spiral notebook.

Quizzes: Quizzes will be either in class or take-home. If I give you an in-class quiz, you will have no more than 10 minutes to complete the quiz. You may use your homework notebook.

Exams: There are five exams. If you can do the homework and material we discuss in class, you will be prepared for the exam. If you should miss an exam due to an emergency, please make sure to bring verification. There is ONE make-up test on Friday 11/30 at 7:00 a.m.

Office Hours: Take advantage of them. I have office hours before class and I am also available the hour after class most of the time.

Attendance

Online Netiquette

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others’ opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
