**Course Description**

This course provides the electrical worker with instruction in basic lighting and NEC requirements for lighting fixtures for indoor and outdoor use; an introduction to motor basics, calculations, transformers, instruments for testing, wiring, protection, maintenance, and troubleshooting for various types of motors and motor controls; introduction to heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning (HVAC) systems, system maintenance equipment, and safety requirements for varied locations ;principles of combustion, hazardous materials and their reactions in varied locations; and the use of safety equipment.

1. Design & describe the installation of an electrical power distribution system for a farm, including the loads & circuits required for various farm buildings & operations. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
2. Demonstrate familiarity with NEC requirements for mobile home park electric service & wiring, mobile home circuit loads & code requirements for motorhomes. (IL01, IL02, IL03, IL04)
3. List the rules for bonding metal fixtures & parts around swimming pools, explain grounding requirements for swimming pool wiring & demonstrate wiring techniques required for the installation & wiring of underwater lighting fixtures, (IL01, IL02, IL04, IL05)
4. Demonstrate wiring techniques for installing telephone & computer cabling in new & existing dwellings, discuss the installation & operation of standby power systems, transfer switches, & uninterruptible power supplies, (IL01, IL02, IL04, IL05)

**Course Objectives**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate and practice OSHA safety & lab procedures.
2. Explain how & when to support conductors in vertical conduit runs.
3. Plan & setup for a cable pull.

4. Explain the necessity of overcurrent protection devices in electrical circuits.
5. Define the term associated with fuses & circuit breakers.
6. Select contactors & relays for use in specific electrical systems.
7. Describe the operating principles of contactors & relays.
8. Identify the types of prints that an electrician may read in motors & control logics.
9. Recognize & use standard electrical symbols, specification & authorities for an installation.
10. Describe the various types of motor enclosures.
11. Discuss NEC regulations for single phase, three phase AC & DC motors.
12. Describe, install general motor protection requirements as delineated in the NEC.

### Attendance

### Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.
