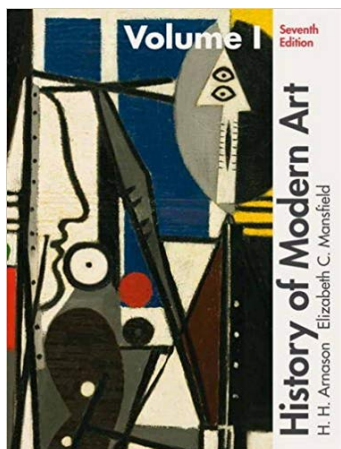

## Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This is primarily a **lecture and discussion** course, which means that your **attendance and participation are mandatory**. You will earn participation points each class period, so arrive prepared, on time, and ready to stay in the classroom for the full class period. Being late and leaving the classroom distracts your classmates and me and will result in lost points. Participation points cannot be made up, but will be excused for absences pre-approved through the college.

To assess your achievement of course objectives, there will be **three exams** and one **final creative project**. The exams will consist of image identification, multiple-choice questions, and a short essay. You may use your hand-written notes, but you'll want to be sure to study well ahead of time. Please bring a **Scantron form** for the multiple-choice questions.

The final creative project asks you to synthesize what you've learned into a final project that connects the course material to your own interests. You should spend at least **10 hours** on this project outside of class, as recorded in a log that you'll submit along with the project. You'll present your project to your classmates in our Canvas site, and will review your classmates' projects there using the attached rubric. **See the assignment sheet for all details.**

You may earn **optional extra credit** by viewing and writing a brief report about the exhibitions at the Juanita Salazar Lowe Art Gallery on campus. There are three of these exhibitions this semester, and you may earn up to 15 points by providing a brief (one page of text) summary of the show as a whole and then describing and analyzing one piece that particularly caught your eye.

**Out of Class Assignments:** The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

*This means that since this is a 3-credit course, you're responsible for **about six hours of work outside of class** each week. You should use that time to read the textbook, review your lecture notes, study for the exams, and work on your final creative project!*

#### Late Policy:

Late assignments will be docked one letter grade (10%) for each day they are late. Assignments later than one week will not be accepted without prior approval.

### Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. ### Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another’s work and recognize the importance of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one’s own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to “cite a source” correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
