Course Description

ESL 001 is a grammar class in an English-only environment designed for the beginning or false beginning ESL student. The course will cover grammar and simple sentence writing. (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of, and ability to use, correct punctuation and mechanics.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Write simple sentences demonstrating ability of the above-mentioned grammatical areas with correct grammar and mechanics.
- 2. Demonstrate ability using there is/ there are in affirmative, negative, and interrogative sentences, and with articles a/an.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to recognize and use prepositions of time and location.
- 4. Demonstrate ability to use subject and object pronouns, and possessive adjectives.
- 5. Demonstrate ability to use nouns: singular, plural, count, and non-count including correct spelling and appropriate possessive forms.
- 6. Demonstrate competency in using the modal "can" for ability.

- Demonstrate ability to create statements and questions in the affirmative, negative, and imperative forms in the following tenses: - simple present - present progressive - simple past future (be going to);
- 8. Demonstrate ability to use basic subject/verb agreement.
- 9. Demonstrate the ability to classify parts of speech and to identify parts of a sentence.

The course will consist of short lectures, individual, pair, and group work. You are expected to participate actively in class and ask questions. You must communicate in English at all times.

You will complete in-class writing exercises for participation points. If you are absent during the exercise, you won't get any points.

You will do grammar exercises in MyEnglishLab. It is important that you get your access code as soon as possible because <u>late lab work will not be accepted</u>.

There will be short quizzes and tests throughout the semester. Some of the quizzes will be in Canvas. Specific dates will be announced in class. There will be a Final test on the last week of the semester.

You must complete all the assigned work in a timely manner. No make-up quizzes or tests will be allowed without a prior arrangement.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. - What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

Academic Honesty
