Course Description

This Course provides the theory and skills for repairing Diesel engines and related accessories. The proper procedures for disassembling, and rebuilding are covered. The complete engine is reviewed with emphasis on the status of the engine components and to return to service after proper reassembly, adjustment and testing.

- 1. Define the terms that describe basic Diesel Operation.
- 2. Identify the difference between a natural aspirated engine and manifold boosted engine.

- 4. Explain engine torque, horsepower and rating for diesel engine.
- 5. Explain volumetric efficiency, thermal efficiency and total engine power.
