In order to facilitate student success, our course has an embedded tutor specifically assigned to our class. The tutor is familiar with the assignments and offers additional student support. Students enrolled in an English class with an embedded tutor have a success rate of 65% compared to a 58% student success rate without an embedded tutor.

# **Course Description**

This lab class offers intensive instruction in writing, research, reading, and critical thinking skills to promote success in a concurrent English 110 course. This course allows a qualified student to bypass English 009. This course follows the freshman composition co-requisite model of acceleration.



## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Critically read, analyze, and evaluate a variety of primarily non-fiction texts for content and context.
- 2. Utilize appropriate pre- and post-reading strategies to analyze patterns of organization within a variety of texts.
- 3. Write grammatically correct sentences that adhere to conventions of written English.
- 4. Integrate the ideas of others through paraphrasing, summarizing, and quoting utilizing appropriate MLA format and guidelines.
- 5. Compose an essay with an introduction, body, and conclusion, which includes organizing an essay around a controlling idea and developing main idea paragraphs with effective use of supporting details.

### **Course Objectives**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Students will be able to write an expository essay that demonstrates beginning competence in both form and content. The essay will 1) address the writing task 2) be organized 3) use details and examples to support the thesis and 4) demonstrate facility with grammar and syntax. The essay will be supported by the lab work and written according to the guidelines set in the co-requisite English 110 course.

## **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

Lab Activity- The course is a lab component for some English 110 classes. As such, the primary instructional activities in the class will be geared toward improving and enhancing the students' understanding of the course material and assisting in the essay development process. **Two (2) hours of independent work done out of class** per each hour of lecture or class work, or 3 hours lab, practicum, or the equivalent per unit is expected.

## **Course Grading Based on Course Objectives**

## **Course Policies**

#### Attendance:

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. The "Check-in Discussion Post" must be completed before 6:00 p.m. Sunday February 21 or you will be dropped from the course.
- Should re-admission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See the <a href="General Catalog">General Catalog</a> for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.

#### What does it mean to "attend" an online class?

Attendance is critical to student success and for IVC to use federal aid funds. Acceptable indications of attendance are:

- Student submission of an academic assignment
- Student submission of an exam
- Student participation in an instructor-led Zoom conference
- Documented student interaction with class postings, such as an interactive tutorial or computer-assisted instruction via modules
- A posting by the student showing the student's participation in an assignment created by the instructor
- A posting by the student in a discussion forum showing the student's participation in an online discussion about academic matters
- An email from the student or other documentation showing that the student has initiated contact with a faculty member to ask a question about an academic subject studied in the course.

#### Logging onto Canvas alone is <u>NOT</u> adequate to demonstrate academic attendance by the student.

Academic Honesty There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following examples of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- <u>Plagiarism</u> is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Asking someone else to write your essay or using an essay writing service is a serious academic honesty infraction.
- <u>Cheating</u> is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero "0" on the exam, essay, or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file. A plagiarism score above 25% is a serious error and will result in a point deduction on the essay.

Anyone who allows another student to copy discussion threads, summaries, or essays will also receive a "0" on the assignment – enabling another student to cheat is also cheating. Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the



course and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the <u>General Catalog</u> for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct. Acts of cheating include, but are not limited to, the following: (a) plagiarism; (b) copying or attempting to copy from others during an examination or on an assignment; (c) communicating test information with another person during an examination; (d) allowing others to do an assignment or portion of an assignment; (e) using a commercial term paper service. Also remember, that any paper you have written and submitted to another teacher for a grade no longer belongs to you, it belongs to the instructor and can't be submitted in this class for a grade.

There is an entire plagiarism module available to you in our course Canvas shell if you need more information, but you can always feel free to discuss any questions before you submit your assignment.
