Course Description

An introductory course studying native cultures of the United States, northern Mexico, and Canada. This course covers the history of research based on archaeological and ethno-historical data, such as prehistory and early migration into the Americas. Linguistic, cultural, and religious diversity of the various Native American nations; the diverse geography and environment from the Arctic to the deserts of the American Southwest; the Great Basin; the Columbia Plateau region, and the Great Plains. Coastal areas of the Atlantic and Pacific regions, the impact of European colonialism on Native American cultures and contemporary issues will be discussed. (Same as ANTH 106) (CSU, UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Identify and describe cultural, ethnic, and linguistic diversity among the various Native American Nations/tribes.
- 2. Explain prehistoric migration into the Americas and interaction with the environment and management of natural resources.
- 3. Identify and summarize European effects on American Indian culture as well as contemporary issues.

Course Objectives

In this course, students will develop the ability to:

- Describe the diverse geographic and ecologic regions and the adaptations of American Indians to a diverse environment.
- Trace migration routes of the earliest prehistoric cultures and their impact on the Pleistocene flora and fauna.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the great linguistic diversity of American Indian Nations/tribes.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the similarities and differences of social institutions of various American Indian Nations/tribes.
- Analyze differences between Spanish, Mexican, and American attitudes and policies towards American Indians.
- Demonstrate the importance of professional anthropological ethics when working with American Indians, as well as in archaeological research and applied anthropology, including application of the scientific method.
- Identify contemporary issues of great importance to American Indians.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

The unit module for each week will be posted to Canvas on Mondays. You will participate in a discussion every week from Monday to Thursday, have a quiz every Friday, and an assignment due every Saturday. Please organize your time accordingly and read the unit material early in the week so you will have notes to contribute to the discussion, study for the quiz, and complete your assignment. The quizzes and assignments will open every Monday, so if you would like to complete them early, you can. Please be sure to always upload your work well ahead of the assignment and exam deadlines.

Over an 8-week period, we will cover all 13 chapters of your textbook *An Introduction to Native North America* by Mark Q. Sutton. **There will be no class the week of November 22nd to the 27th.** During the week from December 6th to the 11th, we will review chapters 1 through 13 and have the final exam.

Because this is a three-credit course, students should expect to invest a minimum of nine hours per week.
