Course Description

French 100 is a first semester course in a four-course series leading to a major or minor in French. It is designed for students who have no previous experience with French or wish to review.

IMPORTANT : Work done with translation software or other sources from outside class will not receive credit.

Course Requirements

Weekly Assignments and Compositions

1. A new lesson is posted to Canvas Modules twice a week at 3:30 p.m.: lesson A on Tuesday and Lesson B Friday. Each lesson has three parts: a video, class notes and an assignment. The "devoirs" (homework, compositions, etc.) will be posted Tuesday and Thursday by 3:30. For the purposes of review, all of the video and class notes will remain open until 6/7/2022.
2. The assignment from lesson A is due Friday at 11:59 p.m. The assignment for lesson B is due Sunday at 11:59 p.m. **IMPORTANT: After the due date, the assignments are closed and there are no make-up or extra credit assignments. To have an absence excused, you must submit an official document showing the time, date and reason for the absence. Submit the document to my Canvas email.**
3. There is a quiz ("interrogation" in French) on Tuesday. It is open from 1:30 to 1:40 p.m.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will attain elementary language proficiency in comprehension, speaking, reading and writing. This is the starting point of language proficiency levels where a person can form basic sentences, including asking and answering simple questions. It reflects the level of a person who needs to communicate essentials while traveling in a new country. For example, students will be able to use salutations, identify themselves and communicate information related to their immediate surroundings. They will also be able to communicate ideas about simple everyday activities, like school, restaurants, sports and other activities.

Course Objectives

To acquire beginning elementary knowledge of French language and of the culture of France and the French-speaking world.

Textbooks & Other Resources or Links

You will need a computer or other device with WIFI and integrated or external headphones and video camera.

There is no required textbook.

Recommended: A small paperback French-English bilingual dictionary (new or used). They cost about five to ten dollars on Amazon.com or similar sites. Do not buy a phrase book.

Remember: If you use translation software or other sources from outside the class, you will not receive credit for the assignment.

Accent Marks in Microsoft Word

ACCENT AIGU (as in *café*): Hold down the control-key and type an apostrophe ('). You will see nothing. Then type an *e*. You will then see *é*.

ACCENT GRAVE (as in *synthèse*) Hold down control-key and type (tilde, directly below Escape key) You will see nothing. The type an *e*. You will see *è*.

ACCENT CIRCUMFLEXE (as in *forêt*): Hold down the control-key+Shift and type a carat (^), that is, type CTRL+SHIFT+6. Release keys. You will see nothing. Then type the vowel (*a, e, i, o* or *u*). You will then see *â, ê, î, ô* or *û*.

CÉDILLE (as in *français*): Hold down control-key and type a comma (,). Release keys. You will see nothing. Then type a *c*. You will then see *ç*.

Instructional Methods

French will be the language used in class.

Asynchronous zoom activities: videos, lectures, oral practice and discussion groups.

At home activities: study, write compositions, do homework (*devoirs*) and other assignments, oral practice and possibly presentations.
