Class Requirements and Instructional Methods: Students are expected to attend choir class regularly and punctually. Students will participate wholeheartedly in all class activities, including warm-ups, rehearsal of varied choral repertoire, marking of musical scores as appropriate, and more. Students will attend scheduled musical performances and give of their best. Students will be orderly and disciplined during choir classes and performances, and endeavor to maintain proper decorum. Talking should be minimized or non-existent during rehearsals and performances. Students will be great team-members of the choral ensemble. Students will gain confidence in themselves as blossoming musical artistes. Please note that this is a Choral Performance Class, hence participation in Concerts is important and mandatory.

In addition to ensemble performances, there will also be VOCAL SOLOS, as befits our HYBRID format. Indeed, Concerts will be done via F2F/In-Person; as well as Livestreaming, since we also have an ONLINE Modality.

There will be at least 2 Concerts, a Mid-Semester and Final Concert. These Concerts may be On-Campus, and/or in the Imperial Valley Community. There may also be CHRISTMAS/Holiday Events in which we participate.
