Course Description

This course is designed to be an introduction to American government, its historical foundations, institutions and political processes. We will examine how our political system was designed, how it has changed over time and how public opinion, the media and the "information age" have affected our government institutions and public policy. We will discuss the role and scope of government as it was conceived by the Founders and as it is viewed today. Finally, we will examine current policy issues, weigh the costs and benefits of actions and engage in thoughtful discussion of contemporary policies and actions with a view toward how those issues and actions impact the current political scene. To achieve these objectives, I have chosen a textbook that focuses attention on the role of citizens as key actors in the democratic experiment that we call the United States of America.


Upon successful completion of this course, you will be able to:

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course will consist of a combination of lectures, class discussions, assigned readings, videos, individual projects, out-of-class assignments, and exams.

Each week you will need to complete the following:

- Read the weekly Chapter(s) as required
- Watch Chapter Videos
- Discussion Board Participation
- Take the weekly quizzes on Canvas. Quizzes must be submitted each week no later than the posted deadline.

Students are expected to arrive promptly at each class session having completed the assigned readings. Students are advised to take notes from lectures as lecture material is stressed on graded assignments. Student study groups are also encouraged.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

The final grade will be the total score of all graded course assignments. The graded assignments will consist of weekly quizzes, two multi-chapter unit exams; three written assignments, class participation/attendance and a non-cumulative final exam. The exams and final may include any combination of objective (T/F, multiple choice or fill-in questions, and short answer (definition/identifications). Students are responsible for providing their own text materials.

No make-up assignments or examinations will be granted unless the student can demonstrate legitimate reasons and only if the instructor is immediately notified. Make-up assignments or exams may not be the same as those given at the scheduled time and the instructor retains the right to deduct or disallow points.

ASSIGNMENTS

Quizzes (100 points)

Weekly quizzes covering your reading material will be taken online through Canvas. The quizzes consist of twenty questions and are worth 10 points. Any additional questions or points are EXTRA Credit. Be sure to submit your quiz before the posted deadline. **No late submissions are accepted.**

Discussion Board Participation (200 points)

You will be required to meaningfully contribute to our online discussion board on a regular basis. For each chapter you must respond to each question posted by the instructor AND respond to comments made by at least two of your classmates. The objective should be open and friendly conversation about politics. Also, please note that while you are encouraged to comment on any posted discussion topic at any time throughout the course, you must comment on each of the week's instructor questions by 11:59 PM Wednesday and you must respond to your fellow student's posts by 11:59 PM Sunday.



Exams (60 points)

There are two (2) multi-chapter unit exams throughout the semester, each worth 30 points. The exams will cover material presented in the readings, class lectures and multi-media presentations.

Written Assignments (60 points)

Two (2) written assignments will be assigned throughout the semester. Each assignment is worth 30 points and will be based on readings and lectures. Guidelines and instructions for each assignment will be provided at a later date.

Final Exam (50 points)

The final examination will be based on assigned readings and materials. There will be a Final Exam Review one week before the exam.
