Course Description

This course focuses on the fundamental techniques, skills, and theories of editing as well as the technical requirements for assembling a digital video project. Through a series of hands-on projects, students will put traditional theories of picture and sound editing into practice with an in-depth examination of Adobe Premiere.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

We will be using Canvas to conduct this class online.

Logging into Canvas

Late Submissions and Make-up Work

All discussion questions, assignments, tests, quizzes, and exams are worth points. The point value for each discussion question, assignment, test, quiz, and exam is clearly stated along with instructions within each weekly module. Coursework submitted on time will receive instructor feedback within two weeks. Only assignments may be submitted late for a maximum of half credit, and feedback from the professor may not be submitted within two weeks. Discussion questions, tests, quizzes, and exams cannot be made up or submitted late. It's important to submit all coursework on time and communication with the professor in advance if there is difficulty submitting coursework on time. The student's success in class is very important, so each student is encouraged to reach out to the professor if they are having difficulty in class.

Final Grades

Final grades are calculated based on the total points earned from all completed coursework, divided by the total possible points, multiplied by 100. That percentage will fall into one of the grade percentage ranges below. Students will be able to monitor their progress in class weekly to monitor their final grade projection.
