- 6. Student will perform advanced solo repertoire demonstrating precise rhythms, correct pitches, accurate intonation, accurate articulation, dynamics, phrasing, and expressions appropriate to the literature being studied.
- 7. Student will perform advanced level solos in a stylistically appropriate manner suitable to the genres, periods, and styles of the literature. Additionally, student will perform improvised solos when applicable.
- 8. Student will memorize solo performance literature, when and as appropriate to the artistic tradition.
