## **Course Description**

Basic techniques of painting will be addressed including an introduction to color theory and basic elements of composition as applied to this medium. Subject matter includes still life and landscape, plus some imaginative subjects created through idea generation. Additional materials fee applies. (C-ID ARTS 210) (CSU, UC)

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Develop, create, and present portfolio of original still life and landscape paintings from observation and imaginative paintings that address content using multiple references. (ISLO1, ISLO2, ISLO3, ISLO5)
- 2. Critique works of art. (ISLO1, ISLO3, ISO5)
- 3. Write a descriptive essay about a work of art. (ISLO1, ISLO3, ISO5)

## **Course Objectives**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop aesthetic perception by perceiving the physical world in terms of visual images symbols
- 2. Recognize equipment and materials required for painting: easels, supports, canvases, varnishes, brushes, pigments, and mediums.
- 3. Execute preliminary drawings for paintings emphasizing value contrasts, linear stability, and balanced compositional elements.
- 4. Apply a limited palette of burnt sienna, yellow ochre, ultramarine blue, and titanium white to create a painting from an observed still life.
- 5. Create a transparency painting developed from a precise drawing and superimposing several glaze layers over the preliminary work from an observed still life in naturalistic colors.
- 6. Create a landscape painting from observation out-of-doors.
- 7. Develop idea generation through creation of paintings which address content and are created through the combination of several types of reference materials resulting in works which are planned and presented for

critique.

- 8. Recognize and interpret contemporary art issues and terminology through the completion of writing assignments and verbal critiques.
- 9. Apply compositional elements effectively.
- 10. Develop the ability to mix color, and apply color theory.

# **Work-based Learning**

Work-based Learning (WBL) allows students to apply classroom content in professional settings while gaining real-world experiences. These opportunities will provide you with a deeper, more engaging and relevant learning environment. This semester, I will be offering WBL activities in order to provide you with the opportunity to explore career options that would be applicable to applicable careers.

The following are WBL assignments: portfolio preparation and presentation (required), critique presentations (required), gallery or museum attendance, either in person or virtual, and reviews (extra credit), and art show participation (extra credit).

## **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

Course Overview: This is an introductory course to oil painting. Under some circumstances, acrylic may be used. Ask your instructor. There will be lecture, demonstration, and audio-visual materials as well as painting and critiques (possibly both verbal and written).

Paintings must be completed on canvas in either acrylic or oil and must be original work completed during this semester for this class only, not another class or previous work done some time ago.

The class will be taught IN PERSON in Room 1306. The class is cross listed with the other levels of painting classes, including II, III and IV, which means you will get to see what others are doing and discuss their work with them.

Most everything you need will be supplied including the paint, canvas, brushes, palette and palette knife. Because you MAY be SOMETIMES working from home, we will be supplying water-soluble oil paint that needs no solvent for cleaning up. You may wish additional materials that you will need to purchase.

# **Instructor Expectations:**

- Students who do not attend the first day of class are automatically dropped. (Participation means attending class or contacting your instructor the first week.)
- If you stop attending class, make sure to drop yourself from the class.
- Work is to be turned in on due date no late work is accepted.
- You are responsible for knowing and observing due dates for all assignments.

### What to Expect from your Instructor:

- Your writing assignment will be graded within one week from the due date.

# **Attendance and Participation:**

- You will earn 10 points for consulting your instructor during each class you attend. If you do not

- Understand that if you are not in communication with your instructor, you are not receiving any feedback, guidance or instruction.
- You can earn 30 points for each critique, however, you must attend the set day of the critique, show your own work, be there for the entire critique from start to finish and share your ideas and feedback to fellow students.

## Add/Drop Policy

If, after reviewing the syllabus and orientation, you feel this is not the right course for you, please let me know ASAP, so that you can be dropped from the course and another student can be added in your place.

Students who miss more than two graded assignments (discussions, critiques, etc.) may be dropped from the course. In addition, students who fail to log in to the course for 7 consecutive days risk being dropped from the course. If you are struggling, experiencing issues, or are seriously ill, please contact me immediately so we can develop a success plan together.

Late Work Late work interrupts the flow of learning in this course and could cause serious problems. Critiques are designed to be interactive—the feedback you give to and get from your peers is just as valuable as any feedback you will receive from me. There is no way to make up a critique. Other types of late work will receive a 10% reduction in the grade. Work submitted after 1 week of the due date will not be accepted unless due to illness or some other calamity.

If an emergency arises, such as illness or a family emergency, please let me know ASAP. I can't reiterate enough that your success is my central goal, but your success also involves a partnership between you and me that is supported by strong communication.

## **Essay Grading Policy:**

- The Essay is graded on a percent of 100.
- Grade reflects the overall quality of the work turned in, how complete the work is and whether the instructions from the assignment were properly followed.
- A rubric will be used to grade the essay.
- Missing or unsatisfactory work will be scored "no credit." This is a 0 (F) and averaged into your grade.
- Essays that do not follow the prompt instructions will receive a 0 (F).
- Late essays are not accepted.

## **Essays & Plagiarism:**

- You will be writing one essay.
- All essays will be turned in to a plagiarism checker.
- So that your essay is not cited for plagiarism, the report should be 15% or less.
- Any essay that is suspected of plagiarism will receive a zero.

## **Critiques:**

• There are three critiques throughout the semester.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement. This class normally meets face-to-face for six hours per week.

#### **Critique Rubric:**

Portfolio: The portfolio is a group of paintings, not necessarily held within some sort of folder. Paintings, as

required from each assignment, will be graded as a group at Midterm and for Final at the end of the semester.

Required Midterm and Final Portfolio review: At the middle and end of the semester, submit digital photographs of your paintings to your instructor via email, Canvas messaging or by attaching .jpgs to the assignment in Canvas. You will receive a grade with comments and suggestions for all the work completed.

If you miss the Midterm or Final portfolio review, your grade may drop as a result of undocumented classwork.

# Portfolio Grading Rubric - Portfolio Grades are based on four major factors:

- CREATIVITY: Is the work conceptually inventive? Was your painting resonant, gripping, inventive, or memorable? (24.5% of grade) 75 points
- **SKILL LEVEL**: Is the work convincing in terms of form, value and special effects? Is the painting well crafted? Has there been any development or improvement? **(24.5% of grade) 75 points**
- **SUBSTANCE:** How substantial is your learning process? Do you bring intensity, commitment, and energy to class? **(24.5% of grade) 75 points**
- COMPLETENESS: Is your work finished? (26.2% of grade) 80 points
- About the essay: Students are required to complete a 600–900-word opinion essay, meeting specific requirements outlined in the assignment handout. It will be submitted to a plagiarism service on Canvas. Below are the factors on which it will be graded. THIS ESSAY MUST BE WRITTEN IN FIRST PERSON.

  AN EXAMPLE OF THIS IS USING THE WORDS, "I THINK \_\_\_\_," "I SEE \_\_\_\_ " OR "I FEEL \_\_\_," etc.
- THIS ESSAY IS NOT TO INCLUDE ANY BIOGRAPHICAL OR HISTORICAL. INFORMATION.
