Course Description

This course is an overview of the supervision of inmates in the local, state and federal correctional institutions. The issues of control in a continuum from institutional daily living through crisis situations will be introduced and discussed. The course will emphasize the role played by the offender and the correctional worker within a correctional setting. Students will be introduced to inmate subculture, violence and the effects of crowding on inmates and staff. In addition, the course addresses coping techniques for correctional officers in a hostile correctional environment while discussing causes and effects of abusive tactics. (CSU)


1. Identify the basic principles of inmate supervision. (ILO4, ILO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Identify and describe the roles of the correctional worker in inmate supervision and demonstrate knowledge of laws affecting local, state and federal institutions.
2. Differentiate types of communications; body language, verbal and symbolic. Be introduced to the concepts and effective use of active listening, information gathering and problem solving.
3. Describe control issues in daily prison management. Through observation skills, awareness and evaluation the student will define problems, design solutions, and document interventions.
4. Identify tension producing factors and control techniques associated with crisis situations.
5. Describe the methods and purposes of institutional safety and it relates to the structure and organization of inmate control and supervision.
6. Summarize the effects of violence and crowding on inmates/staff and inmate and staff relations.
