Course Description

ESL 005 is an integrated grammar and writing course for students to develop academic English skills at the low-advanced level. Students learn to develop well organized, coherent academic paragraphs and multiple paragraph essays containing advanced level sentence structure and mechanics. Students also learn to edit and revise their own written material. (CEFR B2) (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Correctly form and use verbs in a variety of tenses (ILO 1, ILO 2).
- 2. Write and/or identify a variety of sentences (simple, compound, complex, compound-complex), including questions and negatives (ILO 1, ILO 2).
- 3. Write a topic sentence with a topic and controlling idea (ILO 1).

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Write well organized, cohesive academic themed paragraphs and short essays using correct capitalization, grammar, mechanics, and cohesive devices;
- 2. Demonstrate the ability to write topic sentences with a topic and a controlling idea;
- 3. Use a variety of pre-writing skills (brainstorming, clustering, outlining, etc) which lead to the devleopment of ideas and topics for paragraphs;
- 4. Write using a variety of sentence structure (simple, compound, complex, compound-complex) to write sentences in a variety of tenses;
- 5. Recognize and correct errors in their own and other's writing including: subject/verb agreement, verb tense, modal use, fragmented sentences, comma splices, and run on sentences;
- 6. Use a range of vocabulary to express themselves on most topics pertinent to everyday life such as family, hobbies and interests, work, travel, and current events.

Textbooks & Other Resources or Links

We'll be learning some grammar and improving our English with the help of some tools:



1. **A textbook**. You'll need *Longman Academic Writing Series 3: Paragraphs to Essays* by Alice Oshima and Ann Hogue. Published by Pearson. ISBN: 978-0134663326

2. A computer with stable internet connection. Online learning is much easier when

you're using a computer and not losing signal or using data. You'll need to type paragraphs, upload documents, and take quizzes online in this class, and it's hard to do those things on a cell phone. Make sure you can either use the internet at home or schedule time for yourself to use the computer labs at school.



- 3. **Speakers, microphone, and a webcam.** I post instructional videos for you to watch each week, and we might have some video discussions, too. You'll need some tools to be able to fully participate.
- 4. **Paper and a pen or pencil**. We're going to learn a lot. You probably should write some things down
- 5. **Each other**! We're going to be doing a lot of practicing. Be brave, kind, and respectful as we practice speaking and learning a new language together

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This class is fully online and will consist of videos, worksheets, practice activities, quizzes, discussions, and online assignments. We will study grammar and work on our writing and communication skills. We will be writing 4 paragraphs and 1 essay. There will also be a midterm and final exam.



Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement. *for this class, that means you may be doing up to 15 hours of homework a week. Plan time in your schedule

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

This class uses a weighted grading system. The points for each assignment count toward a category. The weights are as follows:

Grades will be posted in Canvas. Students must earn 70% or higher to pass the class.

Work Week: Due dates are on Wednesdays and Mondays; however, students are encouraged to submit work early on any day they prefer.

Late Work: All homework assignments must be submitted on or before the date they are due. As a rule, late work is not accepted, and make-up exams are not allowed. It's recommended that you submit assignments early and not wait until the due date.

If you have an emergency or a health issue and that prevents you from participating in the course for a few days or longer, please contact me so we can make arrangements for you to complete your work. Quizzes and discussion assignments will not be accepted late and must be completed on **or before** the original due date to get points.

Course Policies

Attendance Policy: Attendance in an online class is determined by participation or submission of an assignment or activity. In this class, students must submit an assignment by the third day of the semester to remain in the class and avoid being dropped.

Participation Policy: People learn better when they are connected as a community. I encourage and expect all students to work together and participate in discussion boards, video posts, and occasional, optional video conferences using English only.

Respectful Use and Speech Policy: All students should be respectful to each other and the instructor. Remember that we are all here to learn, and learning requires practice. Nobody is perfect, and nobody in the class should feel scared or embarrassed about making mistakes. They are a part of learning! I expect all students to be treated with respect. If someone disagrees with an opinion, it is not an opportunity for name-calling or belittling. It is a time to respectfully listen, contemplate, and learn. We do not have to agree in the discussion boards, but we do have to be respectful and kind. Any instances of disrespect in a discussion or group collaboration should be brought to the instructor's attention and may result in the disrespectful student losing points or being reported to the campus disciplinary officer.

Plagiarism and Academic Honesty Policy: Because I want to ensure that you are practicing and learning in this class, I take plagiarism pretty seriously. Plagiarism happens when you copy words or ideas from somewhere else and submit it or repeat it as your own work. We get better at what we practice, and when we copy, we only get better at copying, not the important English skills we should be practicing. Plagiarism is academic dishonesty and is a very serious problem. Plagiarism includes:

- copying and pasting information from webpages (this includes using the internet for support and copying topics, sentences, ideas, etc.);
- copying answers from an answer key or Teacher's book;



- copying the work from another student in your class, in another class, or from a previous term;
- copying information from a webpage or book in Spanish and submitting the English translation as your work. using AI or text generators to complete your assignments.

To help keep track of plagiarism, I use Similarity in our class. Similarity will run a report and show how much of the paper is exactly like another paper or webpage. If more than 20% of your paper is copied from another source, you will be asked to re-do the assignment. If more than one assignment is copied from another source during the semester, you may receive a 0 on the assignment.

What that means: You'll be expected to submit assignments on time or early, be kind and respectful to your classmates, and do all of your own work to the best of your ability without copying or using anyone else's words, ideas, or writing.
