## **Course Description**

This course provides an introduction to the concepts of Algebra. Topics covered include linear and quadratic equations and their graphs; relations, functions and their graphs; polynomial and rational expressions and equations, logarithmic and exponential expressions and equations, radical expressions and equations. Not open to students with credit in MATH 091. (Nontransferable, AA/AS degree only) (Nontransferable, AA/AS degree only)

- 2. Simplify rational expressions
- 3. Simplify radical expressions. Include rationalize the denominator.
- 4. Solve equations, including polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, and logarithmic equations and linear inequalities.
- 5. Graph linear, quadratic, radical, exponential, and logarithmic equations.
