Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course is an online course. There are no class meetings. You will have a week to complete each module. Modules open: Sunday Modules close: Sunday 11:59 pm This class will have multiple forms of instruction, including: Lecture/video Interactive video/activities Group activities, Canvas Activities and exercises in an online workbook. Assignments will include: various forms of writing (individual and group), editing, reading and responding, exams, other



exercises focusing on sentence structure and form, as well as grammar and mechanics. Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out of class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement. Internet access: Homework or other information will be posted on the class Canvas site. To get the information, you need to have internet access. If you do not have a computer or internet access at home, you can use the computers at school. Computers are located in the library and in the Language Lab.

Our Respectful Use and Netiquette Policy: For this course, I expect all students to be treated with respect. If someone disagrees with an opinion, it is not an opportunity for name calling or belittling. It is a time to respectfully listen, contemplate, and learn. We do not have to agree on the discussion boards, but we do have to be respectful and kind. Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
