- 2. Understand key terminology from each humanities area: art, architecture, music, literature, and performing arts.
- 3. Recognize different forms, media, and styles from each humanities area: art, architecture, music, literature, and performing arts.
- 4. Compare genres and/or historical periods from each humanities area: art, architecture, music, literature, and performing arts.
- 5. Analyze major works from different historical periods.

## **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

- 1. Participate every week. Any student who does not complete the initial assignment for the class in Week 1 by the deadline will be dropped from the class. Students may be dropped at instructor discretion if they fail to turn in assignments two weeks in a row.
- 2. Deadlines are deadlines. No late work will be accepted.
- 3. You are responsible for keeping track of your class grade average and the drop deadline.
- 4. Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

**Weekly Assignments**: Each week, you will be required to go onto Canvas and review that week's readings, videos, and assignments. As part of this review, you will be required to complete one or more assignments and/or quizzes. These will be due on the Wednesday of each week at 11:59 PM.

**Discussions**: There will be frequent discussions to complete. For each, you will be required to submit one main post and several follow-up replies to your fellow students. These will also be due on the Wednesday of each week at 11:59 PM.

**Creative Projects**: You will be asked to complete four creative projects during the semester: two for visual art, one for literature, and one for film. The due dates for these are posted clearly in the class schedule below and on the modules.

**Midterm and Final**: The Midterm covers all material from the first part of class (the visual arts); the Final covers all material for the second part of class (literature & the performing arts).
