Course Description

A continuation of SPAN 100 with the main emphasis on the imperfect, preterit forms, for both regular and irregular verbs, commands, and prepositions. The student will be familiarized with those features of Hispanic culture which reflect the different frame of reference from which the native speaker of Spanish views the world. We will cover: Chapters Preliminary B, 7 through 11 of the textbook and MySpanishLab.

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Prerequisite: The student must be able to speak and read English.

Not open to students with native ability in Spanish or those who have studied in a Spanish speaking country. (See SPAN 220). The student can be successful in SPAN 110 after having achieved all the minimal performance objectives specified for SPAN 100. Either a recent course in SPAN 100 or a recent 2 year high school Spanish course with good retention should enable the student to succeed in this class. For additional oral practice, concurrent enrollment in SPAN 113 is recommended.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Make affirmative and negative sentences using correct word order and verb forms. (ILO1)
- 2. Respond orally in the target language using correct syntax and grammar. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 3. Use common Spanish speech patterns and phonetic analysis to communicate in the target language. (ILO1)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Use correct word order and verb forms make interrogative, affirmative, and negative sentences.
- 2. Correctly translate commonly used phrases. (English-Spanish and Spanish-English).
- 3. Respond orally in the target language using correct syntax and grammar.
- 4. Demonstrate proper cultural demeanor.
- 5. Use common Spanish speech patterns and phonetic analysis to communicate in the target language.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Computer and other important information: This is an online course, make sure you have reliable access to computing resources.

- Have the minimum hardware, software, and browse; understand basic personal computer operations.
- Be familiar with Microsoft Word and Canvas, the Internet, know how to browse, search, and download.
- Read information effectively and follow instructions.
- Be willing and able to make weekly progress on the coursework.
- Be prepared to spend an adequate amount of time completing the activities, assignments, homework, and tests/exams and meet deadlines.
- Your computer must have an integrated microphone for you to complete all the oral tasks.
- Participation in online discussions, in the activities in Canvas and MySpanishlab are very important to succeed in this class. If you do not participate for two consecutive weeks and I do not hear from you, I will assume you are not an active student and you will be dropped.
- This is an online course. You will be doing the assigned reading at your own pace every week. Remember you have deadlines to meet. Communicate with the instructor constantly through email or attend office hours when you have questions about the material, any assignments, deadlines, or if you have other questions. I will be happy to help you.

*Except week 1, all weeks include these 5 modules. In week 1, you will also find a module called Syllabus, Información importante, and How to ..., guides that will help you succeed in this class.

My Spanish Lab homework:

 Homework should be kept up to date by every student. Activities in My Spanish Lab are due on always due Sundays at 11:59 pm. Plan to study 1-2 hours or more a day on your own. It is important when learning a foreign language to practice listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills as much as you can outside of the classroom. It is important that you manage your own pace doing the work in both platforms and do not wait until the due date to complete all of the tasks because if you have an issue with internet or something else, you won't be able to finish the activities. Late work is not accepted.

Your first assignment is due Sunday August 20 at 11:59. You must do the Syllabus quiz on Canvas or you will be dropped from class.

Discusión:

When you enroll in an online or hybrid class, it is especially important that you keep good communication with your classmates. For this reason, every week I will give you a prompt/question related to the material covered during the week and you will have to write a 100 word paragraph in Spanish expressing your opinion using the vocabulary learned during that week or previously. It will be due Thursday at 11:59 pm. You will have to make a comment to two different classmates by Sunday at 11:59. The discusión is an important part of your grade as participation. At the end of the semester, I will drop the lowest score from the discusiones. If for any reason you miss a discusión (illness, death in the family, etc.), consider this your lowest grade and I will drop it. (You will find it under Módulo Discusión).

Video Cultura:

• Every week you will watch a video about a Spanish speaking country where you will learn about their culture. After watching it, you must write a brief reflection of what you learned. These will be due Sundays at 11:59 pm (You will find it under Módulo Cultura).

Midterm exam:

• The midterm consists of two different sections: 1) My Spanish Lab, which will cover chapters Preliminary B, 7, and 8 2) Video: You will be graded on preparation, vocabulary, fluency, pronunciation, ability to communicate in the target language, etc. Not speaking enough Spanish in the video lowers your grade. More information will be provided during the semester.

Final exam:

• The final consists of two different sections: 1) My Spanish Lab, which will cover chapters Preliminary B, 7, and 8 2) Video: You will be graded on preparation, vocabulary, fluency, pronunciation, ability to communicate in the target language, etc. Not speaking enough Spanish in the video lowers your grade. More information will be provided during the semester.

Chapter tests:

There will be six chapter exams. I will drop the lowest score from tests at the end of the semester. If for any
reason you miss a test or a quiz (illness, death in the family, etc.), consider this your lowest grade and I will drop
it). In addition, expect quizzes (written or oral) on spelling, grammar, homework assignments, and reflections on
history, vocabulary, and culture. There will be NO MAKE-UP TESTS -Except in cases of documented emergencies,



at the discretion of the professor. For reasons of fairness and the integrity of the class, there are NO EXCEPTIONS.
