Course Description

The beginning Spanish course is based on a contrastive analysis between Spanish and English and is designed to develop in the English-speaking student rudimentary abilities in the four basic language skills: hearing, speaking, reading, and writing. The main emphasis is on the present tense of both regular and irregular verbs. The student will be familiarized with those features of Hispanic culture, which reflect the different frame of reference from which the native speaker of Spanish views the world. The class is conducted in Spanish. (CSU, UC).

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Prerequisite: The student must be able to speak and read English. Not open to students with native ability in Spanish or those who have studied in a Spanish speaking country (See SPAN 220). For additional oral practice, concurrent enrollment in SPAN 113 is recommended.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Organize information about a historical or cultural aspect of a Spanish-Speaking country for a written or oral assignment. [ILO1, ILO3, ILO5]
- 2. Successfully communicate at the novice/elementary level a personal event in the present tense. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 3. Describe basic daily life situations using correct grammatical structures, vocabulary, and idiomatic expressions (ILO1)

Course Objectives

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the Spanish sound system.
- 2. Use the Spanish writing/spelling system with its diacritical marks, especially the accent.
- 3. Practice receptive skills through coordinated written and spoken material.



- 4. Practice productive skills, by repetition, use of cognates, and real-life situations appropriate to the university level.
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge of grammar to allow communication from controlled use of language forms to openended communicative activities.
- 6. Demonstrate knowledge of the language skills in speaking, listening, writing, and comprehension according to the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Language Proficiency Guidelines.
- 7. Identify the varieties of Spanish and its speakers through recordings, maps, and videos.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

The Student Activities in My Spanish Lab online (Capítulos Preliminar A, 1-5): should be kept up to date by every student. They are due on Sundays at 11:59 pm. Plan to study 1-2 hours or more a day on your own. It is important when learning a foreign language to practice listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills as much as you can outside of the classroom.

MODULES: Weeks are broken down into modules:

- 1. Vocabulary
- 2. Culture
- 3. Grammar
- 4. Discussion
- 5. My Spanish Lab

*Except week 1, all weeks include these 5 modules. In week 1, you will also find a module called Syllabus, Repaso and Información importante.

Homework: Your first assignment is due Sunday Augst 20 at11:59. Pm. You must do the Syllabus quiz on Canvas. Submit homework on time. The homework will be assigned every class. No late homework, assignments, or quizzes will be accepted unless a valid medical excuse, within two days of your return. You are responsible for the work missed during your absence. Remember, My Spanish Lab activities are always due on Sundays.

Reflexión: When learning a language, it is especially important that you practice the target language orally. For this reason, every Thursday you will read a reflection in class, with topics related to the material covered during the week. Come prepared and ready to read it in class. Reflections are an important part of your grade as participation. At the end of the semester, I will drop the lowest score from the reflections. If for any reason you miss a reflection (illness, death in the family, etc.), consider this your lowest grade and I will drop it.

Midterm exam: The midterm consists of two different sections: 1) My Spanish Lab, which will cover chapters Preliminary A, 1, and 2, and 2) Oral interview: More information will be provided during the semester.



Final exam: The final consists of two different sections: 1) My Spanish Lab, which will cover chapters 3, 4, and 5, and 2) Oral interview: More information regarding this exam will be given by the instructor.

Oral Midterm/Oral Final: You will prepare for oral interviews. You will be graded on preparation, vocabulary, fluency, pronunciation, ability to communicate in the target language, etc. Not speaking enough Spanish in presentation lowers your grade. There will be two presentations in class as part of your midterm and final exams.

Chapter exams (exámenes): There will be six chapter exams. I will drop the lowest score from tests at the end of the semester. If for any reason you miss a test or a quiz (illness, death in the family, etc.), consider this your lowest grade and I will drop it). In addition, expect quizzes (written or oral) on spelling, grammar, homework assignments, and discussions on history, vocabulary, and culture. Quizzes will be announced and unannounced. There will be NO MAKE-UP TESTS OR QUIZZES -Except in cases of documented emergencies, at the discretion of the professor. For reasons of fairness and the integrity of the class, there are NO EXCEPTIONS. The last examinations will be held during the second week of December.

Lab: All Thursdays we will go to the computer lab at IVC to work on My Spanish Lab Assignments. If you have questions, I will be there to assist you.
