Course Description

This course is the study of advanced concepts in smart home instrumentation. Topics will include: sensors,

instrumentation circuits, and microcontrollers. Students will be Installing equipment such as: Smart home panels, Hubs, structured cable, A/D converters, and virtual instrumentation controllers.

- 5. Apply digital design instrumentation techniques to various measurements situations.
- 6. Set up and install various system designs and interfacing arrangements for Smart home panels
- 7. Compare hybrid systems for Smart home installations.
- 8. Install panels for smart home instrumentation in the Lab.
- 9. Apply different interface modules to Hub control panels
- 10. Analyze the new devices and technologies for Smart Home Instrumentation.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Students will be given assignments to build and test each topic on a Protoboard.
