  - identify yourself, (2) include a subjectline, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].
  - Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect
    the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding
    intellectual property. There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of
    honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to
    serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.



- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's owned the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.

  use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context
