Course Description

- This course is an introduction to music literature focusing on listening experience. Students study major forms of music literature, including rich expression of music and music in the Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical and Romantic eras as well as 20th century, Jazz, American music, Rock and non-Western music.
- This course focuses on the skills and understanding required for a life time listening experience. (C-ID MUS100)(CSU, UC)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

None. No prior knowledge of Music is needed for taking this course.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Student will learn and use critical listening skills to discuss and critique a musical work. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
- 2. Student will learn to identify all the instruments in an orchestra by their appearance and their sound. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
- 3. The Student will learn how identify the "form" of a classical or jazz composition through repeated listening. (IL01, IL02, IL04)
- 4. Student will know the names of the most important Baroque composers and their most significant compositions. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)



Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the place of music within human society since prehistory.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the materials of music (rhythm, melody, harmony, timbre, texture, and smaller forms-motive, phrase, sentence, period, one-part, Binary, Ternary).
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the larger forms of music (song forms, fugue, rondo, theme and variations, Baroque sonata, sonata-allegro, Classical sonata cycle, concerto, symphony, string quartet, etc.).
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of the historical periods of traditional music.
- 5. Develop skills as an active (as opposed to passive) listener appropriate to the study of music.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

- This course is taught entirely face-to-face, so students must attend class to complete. Additionally, familiarizing yourself with the weekly updated module content as review material is essential to successfully progress through the course.
- Throughout the duration of this class, the following assignments are imperative in accordance with the class schedule:
- Assessments The class schedule includes four quizzes, three exams, and two discussions. All quizzes and tests are administered through the Canvas Quiz section and subsequently submitted. Consequently, they can be conveniently completed from home.
- Quizzes These assessments will evaluate students' understanding of music forms and genres from different periods. Both quizzes and exams will consist of multiple-choice questions (except 1st quiz) and offer up to two attempts.



- For the essay assignment, students select one of the composers designated by the professor and submit it by researching the composer's life, music and characteristics of that music. Submission is done online at Canvas.
- Off-Campus Tasks: The Department of Education's policy stipulates that one (1) credit hour is reflective of a workload that reasonably corresponds to no less than one hour of in-class time and four hours of independent study per week throughout a semester. Therefore, students must review and study all classes according to the professor's instructions. WASC has similarly endorsed a comparable guideline.
