Course Description

COURSE/CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course presents a study of the techniques of calculus with emphasis placed on the application of these concepts to business and management related problems. Students take this course to prepare for courses for which calculus is recommended and/or required, as well as to study the ideas and concepts of advanced mathematics as applied to a modern computerized society. Topics covered include pre-calculus concepts, applications of derivatives and integrals of functions including polynomials, rational, exponential and logarithmic functions, differential equations, and functions of several variables. (C-ID: MATH 140) (CSU, UC credit limited. See a counselor.)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Demonstrate problem solving strategies by identifying an appropriate method to solve a given problem, correctly set up the problem, perform the appropriate analysis and computation, and share their interpretation of the conclusion or the outcome, using correct grammar or in an oral presentation. This outcome will be assessed through selected exercises on exams throughout the semester. Course Objectives.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Find the derivatives of polynomial, rational, exponential, and logarithmic functions. 2. Find the derivatives of functions involving constants, sums, differences, products, quotients, and the chain rule. 3. Sketch the graph of functions using horizontal and vertical asymptotes, intercepts, and first and second derivatives to determine intervals where the function is increasing and decreasing, maximum and minimum values, intervals of concavity and points of inflection. 4. Analyze the marginal cost, profit and revenue when given the appropriate function. 5. Determine maxima and minima in optimization problems using the derivative. 6. Use derivatives to find rates of change and tangent lines. 7. Use calculus to analyze revenue, cost, and profit. 8. Analyze functions of several variables. 9. Find definite and indefinite integrals by using the general integral formulas, integration by substitution, and other integration techniques. 10. Use integration in business and economics applications. Simplify trigonometric expressions.
- 2. Solve trigonometric equations, triangles and applied problems that can be modeled by trigonometric functions.
- 3. Identify special triangle and their related angle and side measures.

- 4. Graph trigonometric functions and their inverse functions and apply changes in period, phase and amplitude to generate new graphs
- 5. Prove trigonometric identities and use the identities to solve for exact values, simplify expressions and solve trigonometric equations.
- 6. Classify and graph conic sections.
- 7. Analyze parametric and polar equations, functions and graphs.
- 8. Evaluate sequences and series.
