- 15. Perform solo literature in a stylistically appropriate manner, suitable to the genre, period, and style of the repertoire. Also, demonstrate proper blend and balance when performing with an accompanist.
- 16. Memorize solo performance literature, when and as appropriate to the artistic tradition.
- 17. Present vocal solos in a minimum of 3 languages, demonstration mastery of diction in French, German, Italian, English, Latin, etc.
